Socio Cultural & Educational Tour to Japan 2015

Greenwich University has a proud tradition of organizing International Tours for its students in an attempt to broaden their horizons and to instill in them the ability to appreciate different cultures. After every trip the students design a souvenir booklet covering cultural values and the economic position of that country.

It is worth mentioning that Greenwich University is the first University in Pakistan to take its students on an excursion to Japan. With context to this Greenwich University also held a fashion show, "The Land of the Rising Sun" honoring the Japanese Culture at the University Campus. A delegation consisting of students, faculty and management staff lead by the Vice Chancellor visited Japan from 7th June to 15th of June, 2015 as per scheduled.





The first stop on the trip was the Tokyo Bay which is located in the Southern Kanto Region of Japan. Tokyo Bay is a beautiful sight especially with its Aqua line crossing through the middle of the Bay. The delegation also explored the Tokyo Bay in a rental boat which too served to be an adventure for the many tourists. They next visited the Hosei University (Tokyo University of law and politics) It is considered to be Japan's 3rd most prestigious University according to their National Surveys. There they took a tour around the campus, getting a basic idea of the curriculum and education system.

Next, the students visited the ENRI National Lab. No tour to Japan is complete without a visit to Mt. Fuji. The delegation had a one day tour to visit Mt. Fuji which is the highest mountain peak in Japan. The delegation



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toured Mt. Fuji and Hakone; the Fuji Five lakes were also visited at the base of the mountain.

The delegation also visited the multi-national automobile manufacturing factory Nissan Motor Company Ltd as a part of their Socio Cultural & Educational Tour. The delegation later went sight-seeing in Kamakura where they visited various temples, shrines and traditional Japanese Gardens. Later on they visited the Tokyo Tower which is the second highest structure in Japan; it is a mass communications and observation tower located in the Minato district.

The delegation also went to "Tokyo Disney Land" where they spent the entire day in the theme park, getting their adrenaline to a new highest in the various rides and enjoying all of the events happening in the park.

Another thing worth mentioning is their food. Japanese food is not only delicious but is highly nutritious. Their diet includes fish, miso, udon, soba, rice and various vegetables. It is because of their rich diet that the people there are healthy and tend to generally live longer.

The station is called GUR, an acronym for "Greenwich University Radio." It draws from the pool of talent residing in the University. It has not gone live yet, but the students have been working on it for three months now.

"The station is going to be eclectic," says Umer, 21, who RJs and works in FM 105, when he isn't at GUR. FM 105 Director, **Zulfiqar Ali Shah** wished the University the best of luck in this endeavor and that GUR had both his and his technical staff's support if they are ever in need of assistance. In the soft launch ceremony, the Vice Chancellor of Greenwich University Ms. Seema Mughal said that she hopes GUR brings out the best of the raw talent present in the University.

Mrs. Arifa Shamsa, who is amongst the legends in Pakistani Radio history recorded the first program for the station and expressed her best wishes for GUR. The director of the University, Mr. Saeed Mughal says it's a dream come true and that he has the best wishes for GUR.

"We are playing what we want to listen to," says program director Mr. Fahimuddin. "The goal is to create a radio

station, different from the syndicated, homogenous, broadcasts playing in modern stations."

"The mission of GUR is not just to communicate with students and the University, but to communicate with the community at large," he said.

When the station launched in Mid-May at http://greenwich.edu.pk/radio, all of the shows were pre-recorded, but now as the crew gains confidence and experience, GUR plans to air some shows live.

"The radio station will serve as a laboratory for students in the university recording arts program, where work will need to be produced on a consistent, timely basis. All the equipment is industry standard: Shows are mixed, edited and mastered on Avid digital audio consoles running Pro Tools digital audio software which is essential to produce industry-ready sound engineers" says Mr. Imran Khan, Academic Coordinator.

In the two months that the program has been operating, it has expanded from 1 student to more than 20. "If you train and condition yourselves the right way, you will always find a place in the Mass Media Sector" concluded Mr. Zafar Iqbal Saifi.

Prof. Dr. Pervez Hoodbhoy has been a faculty member in the Department of Physics at Quaid-e-Azam University, Islamabad since 1973. He is the chairman of Mashal which is a non-profit organization. Dr. Hoodbhoy has written and spoken extensively on topics ranging from science in Islam, education to Nuclear disarmament. He is the author of Islam and Science: Religious Orthodoxy and the Battle for Rationality, now printed in 5 languages.

Greenwich University (GU): Please introduce yourself.

Prof. Dr. Hoodbhoy: I am a professor of Physics and Mathematics, I teach at Quaid-e-Azam University and Forman Christian College University in Lahore. I started teaching at Quaid-e-Azam University when I was 23 years old and have taught there till I retired in my 60's and now I have moved to Lahore where I spend an equal amount of time shifting from there to Islamabad.

(GU): Could you tell us about your educational background?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: I completed my schooling from Karachi, did my O & A' levels from Karachi Grammar School. Upon receiving my scholarship, I went to MIT where I spent 4 years doing my Bachelor in Electrical Engineering, a Bachelor in Mathematics and a Master in Physics. Initially I just wanted to pursue Electrical Engineering but later on I was

attracted to the pure sciences. Although I did earn a degree in Electrical Engineering as planned, however my true love is Physics. That is why I acquired my Ph.D. in Nuclear Physics.

(GU): What advice would you give to the coming generations?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: I believe that the coming generations should pursue their academic interests. In Pakistan, we don't really give our youth the choice to choose their careers. Curiosity must be encouraged; it is only when we are curious that we see the beauty around us. Majority of parents present the same trivial choices to their children as it has been done for decades. They stress the importance of doctors, engineers, lawyers etc. which granted are noble professions but however, we need more thinkers and scientists. This is very unlike the dominant culture in India where most of the students aspire to be





the next Stephen Hawking.

(GU): What is 'Mashal'?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: Mashal is a non-profit organization which was initiated by 5 to 6 people 25 years ago. We publish one book a month and the subject matter is diverse ranging from philosophy to science or women rights. By mashal we mean 'mind' and our aim is shama which is to 'enlighten the mind'. As majority of the inhabitants of Pakistan prefer to read in Urdu, we provide good Urdu literature and have also translated various important English publications too.

(GU): What do you believe is the biggest threat Pakistan is currently dealing with?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: The biggest threat currently is the rise of religious and nationalist sentiment. This is an internal threat and can prove to have very grave consequences if not dealt with. In my time, I grew up in a multi-ethnic society but now a monolithic culture is prevalent. Various ethnicities refuse to live together; we are segregating ourselves according to our religious and ethnic backgrounds. We are no less of a nation today than we were in the 50s or even the 70s. Nationalist sentiments have gotten out of hand; people from the various provinces are threatened by each other. We need reconciliation, this can only happen when we realize that some of the provinces like

Balochistan are neglected, damaged and oppressed. These grievances need to be addressed because we cannot afford to handle the situation in Baluchistan like we did East Pakistan.

(GU): What do you have to say about our constant need to compete with India?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: In the fields of science, education and poverty reduction I would welcome it. I encourage healthy competition in areas that could have a positive impact on the whole country. Unfortunately however we feel the need to compete with India only in the area of Defense. We are so busy competing with India trying to build as many missiles as them that we end up neglecting bigger problems that the country is facing. We need to realize two things; firstly, India no longer wishes to occupy Pakistan contrary to popular political belief and secondly, this competition is affecting us more than it is affecting them.

(GU): Coming back from MIT to Pakistan, what is the main difference you find in the two education systems?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: Coming back to Pakistan I realized the degree to which our students are spoon-fed. The exact opposite is observed in other universities abroad, the students there work independently. We might share the same curriculum however the students are expected to behave differently. Here, we teach our students to memorize the principles rather than mastering them. On the other hand, students who study abroad; master the principles and successfully apply them practically to solve various problems. We need to make our students realize that the lecture we teach in university is just an Introduction to the subject; they are to learn the rest on their own.

(GU): The youth today feels that they are not getting enough opportunities here, what is your opinion on the matter?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: Well, we have to admit that Pakistan is no longer as pleasant as it used to be around 40 years ago. The explosive rise in population in the past few decades has also affected this. This increase in population density affects how we relate to one another.

(GU): Could a mass migration of the residents of Punjab towards Balochistan promote overall betterment of the nation?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: If such a thing were to happen, it will create great resentment and present circumstances would not allow it.

(GU): What is the message you would like to give to the students of Greenwich?

Dr. Hoodbhoy: Let us work for a nation where everyone is regarded equally both in the eyes of the law and in term of each other's eye. It is only when we accept human dignity and learn to embrace our differences; we can live peacefully together knowing that no one man has more rights than the other.

Aly Azghar Naqvi

Brand Communication Manager, Pak Oasis Greenwich Alumnus

Aly Azghar Naqvi is currently serving as the Brand Communication Manager at Pak Oasis. Pak Oasis is a company responsible for delivering safe and clean drinking water to the people in rural areas of Pakistan. Pak Oasis manufactures RO (Reverse Osmosis) Plants and currently is the holder of the 2nd largest RO Plant in Asia in Nawabshah.

Greenwich University (GU): Please introduce yourself by telling us about yourself and your educational background.

Aly Azghar Naqvi (AAN): My name is Aly Azghar Naqvi, I've done my BBA from Greenwich University. After Graduation I worked 2 years for CNBC. Later on I went to UK to complete my Maters in Marketing from Middlesex University. After successfully completing my Masters I came back then joined Warid where I worked for a year. I went to McCann Erickson and worked there for a year and a half. My entire team moved to Pak Oasis where I'm currently working as the CSR and Brand Manager.

(GU): How would you compare Middlesex University to Greenwich University at an International level?

(AAN): Well to be honest back in my time things were different, I have heard that Greenwich University has now adopted various international teaching methods but in my days there was no concept of a Plagiarism Check so I would just copy things off the internet and my assignment would be accepted. However, Turn it in reports were used abroad so I had no concept of Plagiarism checks making it a little difficult for me to adjust in the beginning. This isn't really the fault of the University though; the concept of it was introduced later in Pakistan is all.

I do think that the education in UK is comparatively easier than Pakistan; in UK you have to write various assignments and essays and then just appear in one exam. However in Pakistan we have this traditional rigorous routine with various exams. One thing to be noted though is that in UK you have be very thorough, you can't just read one book and attempt the paper. You have to study extensively which isn't always the case here in Pakistan.

(GU): You have currently been working on a number of CSR Projects, could you tell us about them both on professional and personal grounds?

(AAN): Well officially we have started a lot of CSR Projects in Thar for the affected victims. We go visit them every now and then; set up camps, stay with them, provide them food, medicine and things that can help cover their basic needs.

Personally, my passion for CSR has just started recently, two weeks back I witnessed a homeless family lying down in the middle of the road and it affected me. Around this time the heat wave had already hit Sindh, originally it was my wife's idea to start an initiative to help the affected





victims. By the next day we started a Facebook page asking for donations and we attracted many donors. After gathering sufficient funds we first went to Jinnah Hospital where we installed 2 water coolers and 10 stretchers, then we installed a water cooler in NICHS, Civil Hospital also got 10 stretchers and 2 water coolers installed. Similarly Abbasi Shaheed got 10 stretchers and 2 water coolers, Qatar Hospital which is in the Orangi area also got 2 water coolers. We then went to Sirat-ul-Jannah where we installed 2 water coolers and distributed 150 goodie bags to the children there. To summarize, we have installed 13 water coolers and have distributed over a 1000 bottles of water along with ORS.

I also went to Central Jail which originally has the capacity to accommodate 500 people; however 6500 people are crammed in there. Initially I was reluctant to go but once I saw the condition of the place I was moved and my heart wrenched and I immediately decided to help them. There was also this boy currently admitted at AKUH who suffered a massive head injury after colliding with a train and his condition was critical and required surgery. After a number of calls, donations were collected and we managed to raise 2.5 lacs. However the boys' condition stabilized and is currently in no need of surgery. We have deposited 1.5 lacs as the hospital fee and now we are

looking to help someone else with the 1 lac that is leftover.

(GU): Were you ever a part of CSR activities at Greenwich University?

(AAN): Honestly, No I wasn't. I was a very boisterous and mischievous student back then. However, now that I have a child of my own I have grown more sensitive towards these matters.

(GU): What is the vision and mission of Pak Oasis?

(AAN): The mission of Pak Oasis is to install as many RO Plants as possible. The vision of Pak Oasis however, is to help affected communities by installing RO Plants wherever needed, in the case of places like Thar if you need water, you will have to travel 2-3 hours to get it which is very upsetting. The thing about Pak Oasis is that our prod-





uct cannot be bought by the general public. It is bought by the government and we install them wherever the government asks us to.

(GU): Are there any strong competitors in the market?

(AAN): No, there aren't really any big competitors in the market. There are various smaller companies but they do not have the same presence and recognition as Pak Oasis.

(GU): As a Brand Communication Manager what responsibilities do you have?

(AAN): I was originally hired as the Brand Manager but there isn't really a lot of Branding to be done when it comes to an RO Plant. So I started sponsoring events like flower shows and car shows to help promote the brand. I wanted to do more so I ultimately ended up in CSR, and now I am a Brand Manager but I work mostly for Corporate Social Responsibility.

(GU): How do you balance personal and professional life?

(AAN): I think it is at par, I like to involve my family in various activities and I always spend my lunch break at home to be with my family. This is a habit I have had since my first job; I normally come home at 1pm; have lunch, spend time with my family and go to work by 2:15pm.

(GU): What plans do you have for the future or are you happy with your current position?

(AAN): My current job is a great one with a good position at a reputable organization with a handsome salary; however I have realized that this position is more for someone with a desk job. In the future I want to be able to do more branding and marketing since that is my core field, I wish to be able to grow and develop professionally.

(GU): Has Greenwich University played a role in your



personal and professional development?

(AAN): Of course, it has. In the beginning I didn't think that way but I have come to realize my entire social circle and the people I interact with on a daily basis are all associated to Greenwich University. Greenwich groomed me, made me confident and has prepared me for any challenge to be faced in my professional life.

(GU): Your message to the students of Greenwich University?

(AAN): Study hard and do not waste your time. Also never underestimate the importance of a good GPA, if you plan on pursuing further studies abroad your GPA can make or break you.

(GU): Any message regarding CSR?

(AAN): These days we're all so busy in our own lives we fail to look around and realize the number of people suffering around us. Please don't do that. The sense of satisfaction you get from doing this kind of work cannot be matched. Stay humble and keep giving.

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Role of Youth in Combating Crime:

A Seminar

Constant relationship between youth and law enforcement agencies will give them opportunity to help youth to learn different ways to combat crime and about law enforcement functions.

A public awareness seminar titled Role of Youth in Combating Crime was organized by the Department of Mass Communication and Media Sciences on May 9, 2015 at Greenwich University Karachi.

The objective of this seminar was to create awareness among the general public and students about crime and combating crime with the help of youth as the youth is the major portion of our population.

Additional Inspector General of Police Ghulam Qadir Thebo was the chief guest of this seminar. He joined Cadet College Petaro in 1974 and left the college in 1979 after completing his Intermediate. After leaving Petaro, Ghulam Qadir Thebo sat for the CSS examination and was selected into the Police Service of Pakistan in 1985. He did his diploma in Public Administration and has a degree in Law as well. During his tenure, he has been the SSP of Thar, Badin and Shikarpur districts. He also served as DIG in the Police Service at Gwadar, Baluchistan, and IG Prisons for Sindh at the Central Prison, Karachi. In 2014, he was appointed as Additional Inspector General Police with responsibility over the police of Karachi. His role has been instrumental in maintaining law and order in the city of Karachi.

While speaking at the seminar he informed that according to UNICEF Pakistan has one of the world's largest



youth population that is 35 per cent of its population is aged 15 or under.

Further figures released by the Election Commission of Pakistan show that a significant proportion of this year's electorate is made up of people under the age of 35. Nearly half of the 84 million registered voters — 47.8 per cent — are aged between 18 and 35, while 19.77 per cent, or 16.88 million voters, are under the age of 26.

According to him the youth is easily vulnerable to crime which includes drugs, arms, illegal imports, smuggling, women and children trafficking, money laundering, engaging in financial fraud, counterfeiting, illegal immigration and cybercrime. He said that our youth could do a lot of things that could be constituted as being crime. Early intervention plays an important role in keeping minors from embarking on a life of crime.

He was of the opinion that the police alone cannot tackle youth crime effectively, parents, citizens and communities must play their part. He said we will improve the support we offer to young people and parents to deal with problems setting clear boundaries but offering help to those who stay on the right side of the line and make the effort to turn things around. In particular we will respond to the consequences of youth offending by supporting young people who are victims of crime. We will also listen





to the views of young people themselves, ensuring that they can contribute to developing solutions not just feeling that they are seen as the problem. Society must focus on promoting education and healthy activities to help the police department minimize criminal activities in the country.

He urged for the immediate need of some preventive programs that will work to keep youth away from crime and will be run with the help of police and local educational institutions involving teachers, parents and families.

It was an interactive session between Greenwich University students and the Additional Inspector General of Police Ghulam Qadir Thebo in which he replied to all questions in detail. Answering a question from a university student he said the charges of corruption against some police officers could be true, but there was a dire need to find the root cause of corruption. The police officers may be corrupt but we have to rectify the problem rather than only criticize.

A student compared performance of our police with motor way police and requested reason for the difference in performance. Additional Inspector General of Police Ghulam Qadir Thebo replied that the motor way police is remarkably performing very well. The reasons for their positive attitude are good salary packages, job security and respected duty of eight hours which are not given to local police.

Answering another question he said that there was a gap between the police department and general public which

need to be filled from both sides. I am here to fill the gap between my department and our youth. I am personally looking into complains against my officers and you can share your concerns with me.

He appreciated the efforts of Ms. Tahira Tariq and her department for organizing the seminar and stressed that there must be some constant relationship between youth and law enforcement agencies which will give them opportunity to help youth to learn different ways to combat crime and about law enforcement functions. It will further help to bridge the gap between police and general public.

In the end souvenirs were presented to the chief guest by Respectable Vice Chancellor, Ms. Seema Mughal.

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There is a dire need for both public and VIPs to follow the rules Seminar on Road Accidents due to Breach of Traffic Rules

A public awareness seminar titled "Road Accidents due to Breach of Traffic Rules" was organized by the department of Mass Communication and Media Sciences on May 6, 2015 at Greenwich University Karachi. This day is also celebrated all over the world as Global Safety Day.

The objective of this seminar was to create awareness among general public and students about traffic rules and how to avoid road accidents due to breach of traffic rules. DIG Traffic Police Ameer Ahmed Sheikh was the chief guest of this awareness seminar. He is a PSP officer and is holding post of DIGP Traffic Karachi since 2014. He has done his masters in Criminalistics Policy from London School of Economics and Political Science U.K. He has introduced E-Ticketing System, Variable Messaging System (VMS), Reforms in Vehicle Lifting System, Mobile Traffic Complaint Unit and initiated various amendments in existing Motor Vehicles Laws.

He informed during his address that people die more in road accidents than in a terrorist attacks or natural disasters. Around 230,000 people lost their lives in the Tsunami in 2004 and 1.2 million were killed in traffic accidents in the same year.

In an attempt to explain what causes traffic accidents he stated that traffic accidents occur for various reasons. While problems with roads or safety facilities lead to some accidents, majority of traffic accidents are caused by the drivers' failure to abide by regulations and the second reason is poor vehicle maintenance which has often resulted in sudden mechanical failures on the road like break fail.

Unsafe road environments refer to external factors uncontrollable by drivers, such as visibility impairment by darkness, slippery surfaces, insufficient safety facilities,

inadequately repaired vehicles, pedestrians or other vehicles that suddenly get in the way.

Traffic accidents are often caused by ignorance, most drivers learn through experience. This is why so many new circumstances lead to accidents. If we know what happens when we over-speed or suddenly stop under special circumstances including rain, snow or a winding road, we would be careful not to speed or brake suddenly.

While there are some drivers who slow down upon recognizing potential dangers of certain situations, others do not see any possible danger. These differences in danger recognition stem from experience. Drivers with stronger desire to arrive at their destination as soon as possible are more likely to take risks and act recklessly.

There are many types of improper thinking that lead to reckless driving. Such thinking includes believing that it is acceptable to violate traffic regulations as long as we do not get caught; the tendency to go over the designated speed limit; and regarding pedestrians on the road as obstacles.

He presented the figures that 33,000 road accidents were reported in the metropolis out of which 1,150 were fatal in nature. According to him 57% of the victims were bikers and regrettably 90 percent of them were minors. These are the reported figures and we know that there has been unreported accidents as well. He requested all the bikers to wear a helmet as most of the causalities have been due to the impact caused by collision of their heads against the asphalt or concrete.

Everyone expects pedestrians and drivers to comply with traffic regulations. Failure to meet this expectation is the



main cause of unsafe driving. Even when the other driver violates traffic regulations, we can prevent accidents by obliging to traffic laws. In short, abiding by traffic regulations is the most basic preventive measure against traffic accidents.

It is hard to predict sudden changes in direction or speed, or sudden movements of other vehicles, while we use the brakes to signal that we are slowing down, we should avoid sudden braking as it can result in collision.

Accidents often occur even when there is enough intervehicle distance, because the speed of the oncoming vehicle is much faster than it appears. Indeed, it is extremely difficult to accurately judge the speed of an oncoming vehicle from a distance. Speeding is even more dangerous at night because visibility is reduced and light traffic tempts many other drivers to speed.

If we turn without using the indicator at an intersection not installed with traffic lights, we will likely cause traffic accidents. Before turning or changing lanes, always use the indicator to let the vehicles around you know where

you are turning.

There was an interactive session between university students and the DIGP in which he replied all questions in detail. Answering to a question about VIP movements, he informed that there is a dire need for both public and VIPs to follow the rules. He accepted the fact that VIP movements creates a lot of trouble for the public but sometimes security issues compel them to arrange special arrangements for high profile personalities.

Answering to a question raised by students about bribes, he said every member of society has to help the police department to end this evil and corruption. Both the violators and corrupt police personnel's are the beneficiaries of bribe and this has to be ended from both ends. To minimize interpersonal interaction between the public and traffic police; the police department is introducing an automatic system to impose fines after taking pictures of law violators. Initially on test basis 116 fine slips were sent to violators at their home address and surprisingly 80 percent of them were paid which has encouraged them to introduce the system on a larger scale.

He praised the organizer, Ms. Tahira Tariq and her department for arranging this seminar to mark the Global Safety Day and informed the audience that the Karachi Traffic Police is also celebrating the day in cooperation with a multinational company in the metropolis. He also appreciated the presentation and the video produced by Greenwich students to convey their concerns about traffic violations and asked the students to come up with new ideas to help their department enforce traffic rules in the city.

Nowadays, the maintenance of a check and balance has become even more necessary in the wake of frauds and scams in the educational scene.

The BRW students were provided with one month's time duration for the report project submission which was on May 5, 2015. In the light of the given guidelines they were to form triangular groups and work in collaboration with their group members to complete the project. This provided an opportunity to inculcate the team work spirit coordinating and communicating with each other working harmoniously for the achievement of their objectives.

A particular report format had to be adhered to comprising of different report writing sections, namely: acknowledgement, introduction, methodology, results and findings, discussion, recommendations, conclusion and appendices. Keeping in line with the designated report layout, the students were encouraged to use both the primary and secondary data collection methods to conduct research. The primary methods hovered upon approaching the concerned authorities/departments and extracting information through investigative tools such as interviews while reaching larger subject numbers by conducting surveys and filling questionnaires which subsequently became part of the appendices. This involved field work and they had to visit other universities, faculties and students to fulfill the research aims. The report teams represented the data via graphics and findings interpreted for comprehension. So, facts and figures were portrayed by pie, bar and line graphs. Whether the top ranking universities were shown or the graduate and post graduate programs offered or the region-wise distribution or the gender classification-all the various areas were projected through these visuals painting an accurate picture indeed!

The discussion section revolved around an analysis of the factors which led to the uplift or a plummet in the different areas related to the faculties, facilities, ranking and graduate strength. The major issues and concerns faced by the educational sector today were put under the limelight. Causes of tight financial budget, unavailability of resources, outdated curricula, security arrangements, political crisis and lack of training and development were highlighted.

Students engaged in critical thinking skills while deliberating on the factors which were the leading causes for the setbacks in the university sector and even those that led to progress especially the universities like IBA, LUMS, AGHA KHAN and virtual ones ALLAMA IQBAL OPEN UNI-VERSITY which have been able to carve a niche in the international education scene.

Futuristic recommendations which were put forth included the injection of funds in the education sector, overhaul of outdated curricula and evaluation techniques, international faculty training programs, allocation of large areas of land, state of the art computer labs and tech-advanced classrooms, liaison with the corporate sector to provide internships and practical infusions complementing the theoretical knowledge.

The best report project teams were awarded certificates as recognition for their concerted attempt in producing above par reports. It is crucial that courses should incorporate project work providing the students with a practical application of the theoretical knowledge and an avenue for working together harnessing the skills of research, critical thinking and communication in a teamwork setting.

Purposeful planning paves a path preparing one for progress in the practical working planes!

For those interested in Urdu stories, they may also find their books narrated online. These narrations are not just done by absolutely anybody, but by well taught students of the National Academy of Performing Arts; assuring these audio books are of the best quality.

As Mr. Siddiqui came to Greenwich, he was a modest individual who explained the struggles one would endure when starting a new project. Usman Siddiqui was a young boy in the United States, where after his University, found himself working in technology firms. One day he came across Amazon.com and as he was on this project, Mr. Siddiqui brought a similar idea to Pakistan to help encourage education through the most popular pastime, the internet. Initially The Readers Club was not as popular, but now it is found to have over 15,000 followers on

Is early marriage a barrier to girls' education?

"Hey! Are you really married?"... "Isn't it tough to study after marriage?"... "How do you cope university with your married life?"...These are a few questions that Javeria Mohsin, a young girl, is asked by her new fellows at Greenwich University.

She replies to all these questions, and others related to her 'married studying life', with a gentle smile and confident manner.

"Marriage helps you enhance confidence and teach a practical approach towards life. It makes your faith stronger to define big goals and put endless efforts in achieving them, as sincere attempts are more significant than desired results," Javeria says.

She moved to Karachi after her marriage at 19, while she was in the 12th grade of her high school in Lahore. To appear in her college exams, she travelled to her native city and completed her Intermediate. After a small break to settle the new life in Karachi, she joined the Department of Mass Communication & Media Studies to continue her education.

"I feel very fortunate to have such a loving husband and caring in-laws, who understand the importance of education and encourage me to progress as an erudite member of the society," she says.

Spreading awareness to educate our young girls, according to Javeria, is the dire need of the time. She believes a girl must be an active member of the society in performing her due role to bring some progress.

"Yes, I am a wife, a daughter, and a caretaker of my house, but it does not restrict me to proceed in my education. Greenwich is a place where I feel proud to study and am pleased to move on towards progress," Javeria states.

Interestingly, a teacher at the Greenwich University, Tahira Tariq, was also married at 18. She says she had to face many difficulties in starting her education after the early marriage.

"My mother wanted me to study but I was married at 18. I appeared in my second year practical after my marriage. My in-laws were very happy on my successful intermediate result, but I could not continue my education due to domestic reasons," Tahira says.

Acknowledging her father in-law's love for her, she says he was the chief person in her life, along with her husband, who cooperated in her decision for graduating in Mass Communication from the University of Karachi. After completing her graduation, she took no break to start masters in mass communication. She is currently proceeding with her PhD in media studies, teaching at five eminent universities of the city as a visiting faculty, consulting the production team of PTV, and she is also a senior instructor at the Research and Development Department of the Special Security Unit, Sindh Police.

"My home is my priority. I can proudly say that my husband and my children are delighted to see me working for the betterment of my country. I am satisfied for being an active member of both my family and society," she states.

She , however, feels that it was too early for her to get married at 18. She is a woman of the ideology that a girl must not be married before her masters or at least graduation. She says, "A girl can complete her masters at 22 and it is a very normal age to start a married life."

"Why are we always in a hurry to get our daughters married? Let them live some memorable and glorious moments of their lives in universities before they enter practical life. Not all in-laws allow their daughter in-laws to go for higher education. Even I had to wait six years for the fortunate day to start my graduation," she comments regarding early marriages.

Greenwich University is very rich in people with different ideologies. It is a place where the concept of diverse culture and co-existence can be experienced practically. Rizwana Amin, the head of the Humanities Department at Greenwich, is satisfied with her life and being wed at an early age of 19. She believes that the early marriage was never a barrier to her professional development and success in life.

"I was married after my intermediate. I could not initiate my graduation very soon and was simply a house wife. Then I started teaching and simultaneously continued my studies continuing studies which helped me blossom and progress in the field of education," Rizwana says.

She resumed her education after a long break which was a challenge in itself.

She completed her graduation from Karachi University and joined Hamdard University to complete her B.Ed., M.Ed. and MBA along with teaching as a Senior English Language Teacher at two most prominent educational institutions of Karachi,The Bai Virabiji Soparival Parsi High School and The City School, Darakhshan Campus. She also joined the different Universities of Karachi as a visiting faculty.



All this multitasking wasn't so easy or a piece of cake. "My family is my strength" quoted Ms. Rizwana as her family has never been a barrier or hurdle in her professional growth. Infact the support and cooperation that she has received from her family in this whole process is exemplary. Currently she is pursuing her PhD in Social Sciences from Greenwich University.

"Life is not a mathematical formula where we can place ourselves as variables to get desired results at once. We have to adjust with the scenario that we live in," Rizwana states.

We must spread more awareness to let our girls study even after marriage as wisely quoted "when you teach a girl, you teach an entire nation," she says. Society has become more aware, according to Rizwana, in allowing its married girls to get higher education. She believes that time has changed and girls are not compelled to have long breaks after their marriages to restart education.

"We can never neglect the importance of girls' education in Pakistan. We are a country with 63% of youth population, which can surely lead the future to ultimate heights. In recent past, educated women in our society have played a vital role to help the country progress in all the ways, especially in building our economy," she comments.

It is direly needed to educate our girls and provide them a proper space in their lives to groom their professional personalities. We cannot refrain our society from marrying its daughters at a very early age, but we can surely spread the word to allow daughters to study for a better and prosperous Pakistan.
