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Greenwich University's 25-member delegation led by the Vice Chancellor visited the European Parliament to promote educational and cultural exchange across the EURASIAN region. Member of the European Parliament Mr Wajid Khan received the delegation from Pakistan and encouraged such exchange to strengthen people to people connections across borders. Ms Seema Mughal, Vice Chancellor, shared that Greenwich envisions a shining Pakistan on the globe and we have taken a major step in that direction. She also underlined that Greenwich aspires to produce global citizens who could serve as the peoples' ambassadors to present the best of our national glory. Pervaiz Losar, Chairman EUPak Friendship Federation, expressed his delight having facilitated the

first-ever University delegation visit to the EU Parliament that will enhance Pakistan's multi-lateral relations.

Ali Jillani, Head Diplomatic Affairs, Greenwich University, presented Pakistan through its historical residue, rich cultural diversity and artistic brilliance showcasing what best defines the nation. Mr. Kashif explained the importance of creativity in the field of animation. There are five forces behind creativity which include inspiration, motivation, frustration, intimation and curiosity. On the other hand, Azeem Lakhani emphasized on knowing your audience thoroughly is the key for a successful mass communication whether it is an advertisement or film. Only those brands are succeeding who have done a thorough research on their potential target audience such as Ufone. Ufone has always interacted with its consumers and targeted youth which is their potential target market. That's why they have remained first in terms of number of users.

He also highlighted the hurdle that in Pakistan, there are many independent creative writers and musician who have connections with Hollywood but due to censorship policies, it creates a blockage for them. There is a serious issue of freedom of speech in the country which makes difficult for people to execute their ideas.

She explained that social media is all about connecting, creating and sharing content. It is the most powerful tool for




brands which provides them personal data of prospective consumers, interaction with them and accurate feedback of

A session was arranged at Dr. Kamal Auditorium, Greenwich University on February 04, 2019 in which popular drama screenwriters **Zanjabeel Asim Shah** and **Mehwish Hassan** were invited to share their success stories and experiences as experts with the students.

Zanjabeel Asim Shah wrote popular Pakistani dramas such as "Bashar Momin", "Bala", "Cheekh" and "Kaneez". She interacted with Media Studies students and shared their journey as screenwriter till present day. She started her career as associate producer in a newly opened production house at that time where she learned typing at Inpage. Her first drama was "Ek Nazar Meri Taraf" was an immense success. Afterwards, she wrote "Najam" and "Saath Pardo Mein"

She told the students that hardworking is the key to success. A writer must have confidence on her/his skills and writing. Furthermore, if a writer wants to get an instant feedback about her/his story, then, share the story first with your family, relatives or servants. Their reactions will let you know where your story stands. She also stressed upon the importance of Urdu that if you want to survive in Pakistani drama industry you must be fluent in Urdu. She said, "I was good in Urdu that's why I have reached to this stage."

The script writer of "Kisay Chahoon", "Hatheli" and "Wo Ishq Tha Shaid" Mehwish Hassan revealed her success story with the students that her family does not have any background in literature and writing that's why when she



first shared her thought of becoming a drama writer with them, they discouraged her. Mehwish, began her career as a co-writer and editor but then sometimes; some scenes become similar to Indian soaps but still the Pakistani drama industry is growing at a very rapid pace.



she wrote her first drama "Wo Ishq Tha Shaid" which received good feedback, her writing career began and now she is one the most demanding and popular screenwriters of Pakistani dramas. She said that Pakistani dramas are influenced with Indian media that's why

A Seminar on Freedom of Press & Current Media Laws



In our class of course Media Management and Marketing the news about new media law was discussed as there was a hue and cry over media about the new laws and closure of media channels along with some newspapers. There was a news attributed to the information minister that government wants to regulate print, electronic and social media under one law. The proposed law is titled Pakistan Media Regulatory Law (PMRA) which will merge the rules and acts of Pakistan Electronic Media Regulatory Authority (PEMRA), Press Council of Pakistan (PCP) and Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) together and will function as a whole to address all complaints and regulatory aspects of the media.

When the news reports about the PMRA where searched it was found that The Council of Pakistan Newspapers Editors (CPNE) sees PMRA as an attempt to curb media freedom because senior journalists who were critical of government have already been asked to leave their jobs due to financial crunch. Entire channel of Wagat News was shut down costing hundreds of media personnel their live hoods. Senior journalists were of the view that historically media regulation such as PMRA is often an attempt by the state to control the media. Further they were of the view that why PMRA was created without the consultation with the media stakeholders?

It was decided to get the journalists' view on the issue directly from the journalists by visiting Karachi Press Club and by organizing a panel discussion on the freedom of press and current media laws. The objective of organizing the event was

to create an interaction of students with media personalities so that students can learn practical aspects of freedom of press. As our students are also related to the same media industry getting practical and personal views in the light of proposed media laws about the future of media industry was very important for students.

The management of Karachi Press Club was very helpful in organizing the event at Karachi Press Club on 4th April, 2019 titled "Freedom of Press and Current Media Laws". The panelist of our panel discussion were Dr. Tauseef Ahmed Khan, Mr. Imtiaz Faran, Mr. Ashraf Khan and Mr. Mazhar Abbas. Our special guest was Mr. Arman Sabir, secretary of Karachi Press Club who is an investigative journalist with over 25 years of experience in print, electronic and digital journalism, now working for ARY News. Despite of his busy schedule he was also present till the end of the event.

The event started with the recitation of the Holy Quran and brief introduction of the panelists with the audience. A large number of students from Greenwich University, Karachi University and Federal Urdu University, prominent media and journalists were present in the panel discussion. Course in charge Ms. Tahira Tariq gave a brief introduction of the topic and objectives of organizing the event. She quoted the United Nations' 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights which states: "Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference, and to seek, receive, and convey

information and ideas through any media regardless of frontiers".

Dr. Tauseef Ahmed Khan was the first to share his experience and opinion on freedom of press. He is a famous columnist of Urdu language daily Express Newspaper, writer of books, political analyst and educationist who is related to Mass Media since more than 30 years. He gave an extensive information on the history of print media and evolution of freedom of press in South Asia. According to him freedom of press started in the British era with the publication of Hickey Gazette in 1780. He discussed about article 19 of the constitution of Pakistan which provides the concept of freedom of speech. According to him freedom of speech is a natural right of civilized societies to impart and acquire information about their common interests. It had always helped an individual in self-accomplishment, and led to discovery of truth. Freedom of speech had further strengthened and enlarged the capacity of an individual to participate in decision making, and provided a mechanism to achieve a reasonable balance between stability and social change. Such freedom of speech is the foundation of a democracy and the concept of free government for free people.

Our second panelist who came up to talk about freedom of press was Mr. Ashraf Khan. He is the Bureau Chief of Agence France Presse (AFP) where he had extensively covered security, social, and political issues of Pakistan. He have been working with the Associated Press (AP). He has also been associated with Daily Times and Business Recorder. He is also a writer for other prestigious publications. In relation to freedom of press he addressed on the issue faced by jour-



nalists whilst carrying out news and processing it. He also highlighted facts about the freedom of press and current media laws. According to him freedom of the press is the principle that communication and expression through various media, including print and electronic media, should be considered a right to be exercised freely. For freedom of press it is necessary that there must not be any interference from the state and the preservation of freedom may be sought through constitutional or other legal protections.

The third journalist in the panel was Mr. Imtiaz Farhan who is the President of Karachi Press Club and a senior journalist who has worked with several Urdu newspaper and television channels. He is currently associated with News One TV as Bureau Chief in Karachi. He mainly talked about freedom of press in relation to gatekeeping and news editing. He also highlighted the facts about censorship in media. He discussed how the Pakistani Constitution limits censorship in Pakistan but allows reasonable restrictions in the interests of the sovereignty and integrity of Pakistan.

The fourth and the last journalist in our panel was the well-known media personality Mr. Mazhar Abbas. He is well-known for press freedom in Pakistan who has worked as a journalist for more than 27 years and has endured repeated threats as a result of his work. He was associated with ARY News and was secretary-general of the Pakistan Federal Union of Journalists. He discussed freedom of expression in relation to the electronic media industry, the evolution of social media and how is news manipulated on social media. He also discussed freedom of press in the light of



the rise of electronic media and how it has affected traditional media on a large scale.

During questions and answers session journalists were of the view that to a large extent, the Pakistani media enjoys freedom of expression inspite of political pressure and direct bans sometimes administered by political stake holders. Political pressure on media is mostly done indirectly. One tool widely used by the government is to cut off 'unfriendly' media from governmental advertising. Using draconian laws the government has also banned or officially silenced popular television channels. The Pakistan Electronic Media Regulatory Authority (PEMRA) has been used to silence the broadcast media by either suspending licenses or by simply threatening to do so.

In reply to a student's question about censorship, journalists informed students that media freedom in Pakistan is complicated; journalists are free to report on most things however any news articles critical of the Government or the Military and related security agencies are automatically censored. Anything perceived as blasphemous by the country's Blasphemy laws are also automatically subject to censorship.

On behalf of Greenwich University, Ms. Tahira Tariq thanked our valued guests, panelist and journalists for taking time out of their busy schedules to be a part of our event and for their active participation in the discussion. The event ended with the distribution of souvenirs to the guests which was followed by Hi-tea.

"Gender Studies" course of Mass Communication & Media Studies focuses on current gender issues and examines the social and cultural construction of gender with the relationship of gender to personal experiences, social institutions, economics, politics and power. The objective of this course is to examine modern gender relations in our society, in our daily lives, at schools and workplaces, and at home.

During class discussion with the students, a question was raised by the students that does gender discrimination and harassment at workplace exists in our country? And if yes, then how this reality can be revealed from some reliable sources as nobody has the courage to come forward and accept such realities.

After a brain storming session, an idea was pioneered by the Course In-charge Ms. Tahira Tariq that a seminar on Gender Discrimination and Harassment at Workplace may be organized in which professionals from both the genders were to be invited to share their personal experience and to discuss the issue.

The management of Greenwich University always supports seminars and discussions on social issues thus the whole idea was approved and the date of the seminar was finalized; Sun-



day, November 11, 2018 from 12 Noon to 3 Pm at Dr. Kamal Auditorium, Greenwich University, Karachi Campus.

The objective of the seminar was to get the clear picture of the presence of gender discrimination and harassment at workplace in our society and to provide awareness and information about it. In addition to this students must have enough information and awareness as to how they can seek legal help and how does law support and help such victims.

After short listing, famous politician Ms. Shermila Farooqi, media professional Ms. Nadia Hussian, advocate Mr. Nadeem Sheikh, advocate Ms. Aleena Alavi, DSP Shireen Khan from Sindh Police and Regional Commissioner Department of Federal Ombudsman Secretariat for protection against harassment of women at work place Mr. Sikandar Mughal were finalized as guest speakers of the seminar.

Ms. Sharmila Farooqi is one of the leading female Pakistani politicians from Karachi, Sindh. She is the daughter of Mr. Usman Farooqi, who was a bureaucrat and the former Chairman of Pakistan Steel Mills. She earned her MBA degree from the Adamson Institute of Business Administration and Technology, Karachi. She has her second master's in law. Before joining the politics she started her career from showbiz. She





appeared in a drama series called Panchwan Mausum. She played her role along with all the big stars of Pakistani drama industry like Ijaz Aslam, Talat Hussain and Gulab Chandio. Sharmila Farooqi started her political career in 2005, before that she was a very active member and worker of Pakistan People's Party. Sharmila was elected on the reserved seat for women from PPP and she served as an adviser to Chief Minister of Sindh. She is a very confident woman and is heading the media cell of PPP.

Ms. Nadia Hussain is a Pakistani television actress, host, model entrepreneur and fashion designer. She started her career in modelling when she was 19. She is also a practicing dentist and has worked in many drama serials on different television channels. Nadia is considered as one of the top models in Pakistan.

Advocate Mr. Nadeem Sheikh got his law degree from S.M. Law College Karachi. He is presently working as advocate High Court with professional experience of more than 15 years in civil, criminal, labor, human rights and family laws. He is also the president of Justice Helpline which provides free of cost legal services and legal help to poor and needy people who cannot afford court fees and lawyers' professional service charges.

Advocate Ms. Aleena Zainab Alavi has a postgraduate degree in International Development Law and Human Rights from University of Warwick, UK. She is the Managing Partner at Lo Bono Law and the Head of Legal Affairs at Careem Pakistan. Prior to this, Ms. Alavi was a senior associate at an international law firm in Karachi and served as an associate at Ahmer Bilal Soofi & Co.

as well as a research fellow at the Research Society of International Law in Islamabad. Ms. Alavi is a High Court enrolled practitioner and has a keen interest in fundamental rights. She has published numerous articles pertaining to freedom of speech and regulations in cyberspace, rights of marginalized groups and women. Ms. Alavi has also been a visiting faculty member at National Defense University Islamabad, Iqra University Islamabad and Roots College International Islamabad, where she taught different subjects including International Law and International Human Rights Law.

DSP Shirin Khan holds a master's degree in political science and is serving Sindh Police since last 28 years. Presently she is working as Deputy Superintendent of Police Welfare and in-charge complain cell KPO. In 2000 she was the first lady officer who was selected for UN mission by UN SAAT team. She has the honor of working with United Nations peace keeping missions in Kosovo, East Timor and Sudan.

Mr. Sikander Mughal is Regional Commissioner / Advisor at the office of Department of Federal Ombudsman Secretariat for protection against harassment of women at work place. This department is headed by Federal Ombudsperson Ms. Kashmala Tariq.

On November 11, 2018 the seminar started with the recitation of the Holy Quran. The host of the seminar Ms. Amna and Mr. Fasih of media studies department welcomed the students, faculty and the honorable guests. After a brief introduction of the guest speakers the seminar formally began with the introduction of the topic by advocate Nadeem Sheikh.

















Advocate Nadeem Sheikh shared his opinion about the issue that females are afraid to report discrimination and harassment they face at their workplaces because they are scared that their career might ruin, or their family will stop them from working. Senate has already passed a law against harassment at workplace in 2010 but generally people are unaware of it. Government should take measures to spread awareness about it and discussions and such seminars should be arranged for creating awareness, in this way we can overcome the situation to some extent.

According to DSP Shireen Khan, we live in a male-dominating society. Men not only try to control and dominate women at workplace but try doing it in families as well. Our male bosses think that they can work better than their female subordinates. She said that there are very few complains of harassment registered to us which is due to the fact that our women are unaware of the laws against harassment and gender discrimination. Shireen khan herself also faced gender discrimination at workplace in the beginning years of her career.

Advocate Aleena Alavi argued that in this world whether its man or woman, both live with the patriarchal mindset. The need is to change our mindset. There is no difference in both genders, other than the biological difference but there is lot of difference in the expectations of what women should do and should not. Organizations must have day care centers for the children of their female employees in order to support them in their duty hours. She emphasized that there is law, but the problem is, its poor implementation. A female should be at least, strong enough to take the initial step of voicing out the harassment and discrimination she came

across, this way the problem can be lessened.

Sharmila Farooqi, started her discussion by saying that "I am a woman but I can do much better than a man". She denied the fact that there are only few cases reported regarding the harassment. Sharmila claimed that after the law of Protection against Harassment of Women at Workplace 2010 passed, many complains have been reported and several of them have been resolved. We do not know about it because the data was not publicized. She added on, that gender discrimination will always exist, it will never vanish but we can lessen it by talking about it or by taking action against those people who harass their sub-ordinate employees.

Sharmila appreciated Greenwich University for taking such an initiative to organize seminar on harassment and discrimination by saying that there was a time when sexual harassment was a social taboo topic, but now people can openly talk about it which is a positive change.

According to Nadia Hussain gender discrimination has been going on and will continue to happen. She argued that a severe gender discrimination against women in entertainment industry exists which can be witnessed by observing that there is a small number of female directors and photographers than men. On the other hand, in fashion industry there exists a gender discrimination against men because they are paid lower than women.

The last speaker, **Sikander Mughal** gave a brief summary on Protection against Harassment of Women at Workplace 2010 law with the help of an easy to understand power point presentation.





He explained the definition of 'Harassment' according to the harassment at workplace Act 2010 which is "Any unwelcome sexual advance, request for sexual favors or other verbal or written communication or physical conduct of a sexual nature or sexually demeaning attitudes, causing interference with work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment, or the attempt to punish the complainant for refusal to comply to such a request or is made a condition for employment".

He informed that the Act was built on the principles of equal opportunity for men and women and their right to earn a livelihood without fear of discrimination as stipulates in the Constitution. This Act also complies with the Government's commitment to high international labor standards and empowerment of women. It also adheres to the Human Rights Declaration, the United Nation's Convention for Elimination of all forms of Discrimination against Women and ILO's convention 100 and 111 on workers' rights. It adheres to the principles of Islam and all other religions in our country which assure women's dignity. Provisions made in the Protection against harassment of women at the workplace Act requires all public and private organizations to adopt an internal Code of Conduct and appeals mechanism aimed at establishing a safe working environment for working women. It shall be the responsibility of the employer to ensure implementation of this Act, including but not limited to incorporate the Code of Conduct as a part of their management policy. The management shall display copies of Code of Conduct at the conspicuous place in the organization and the workplace. On failure of an employer to comply with this provision the employer shall be liable to fine.








He also informed the audience about the measures to be taken place by the employees, procedure for filing complains and punishments according to Protection against Harassment of Women at Workplace 2010. People who are facing harassment of any kind can report to the Federal Ombudsman of Pakistan by visiting their office. A comfortable and safe environment is provided to female complainants. Complains can also be sent to official website of Federal Ombudsman.

The seminar was attended by a large number of students, faculty members and prominent media. At the end of the seminar a small photo session ceremony was held in which Head, Department of Mass Communication & Media Studies , Dr. Sabir Ahmed and Ms. Tahira Tariq presented souvenirs as a gesture of thanks to the honorable guests. This ceremony was followed by a lavish lunch.

A STREET CHILDREN School Project

Street children are children experiencing poverty, homelessness or both and are living on the streets of a city, town, or village.

According to UNICEF's definition of street children, boys and girls, aged under 16 years, for whom "the street" has become home and or their source of livelihood, and who are inadequately protected or supervised. Street children are found all over the world especially in the underdeveloped countries. It is quite strange that developed countries also have street children. Some street children, notably in more developed countries, are part of a subcategory called thrownaway children, consisting of children who have been forced to leave home. Thrown-away children are more likely to come from single-parent homes.

According to Asia Child Rights the number of street children in Pakistan is estimated to be between 1.2 million to 1.5 million. In our country issues like domestic violence, unemployment, natural disasters, increasing poverty, swelling family size, abuse in schools, neglect and family breakdown, unplanned rapid urbanization, and lack of education are considered the major factors behind the increase in the number of street children. In our metro cities a sub-category of street children known as 'Runaway' children is also found. These are the street children who live or work on the streets, as well as the minority that return to their families at the end of the day with their meagre earnings.

In Karachi usually street children beg at traffic signals and scavenge around rubbish dumps or industrial waste sites or

take on menial jobs as cart pushers or dish washers, working 12-15 hours a day to earn around 75 rupees which is just enough to buy a meal for the day. Most survive by prostituting themselves, stealing or smuggling, making them vulnerable to contracting sexually transmitted infections, HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, Jaundice and liver or kidney disorders. A large proportion of these children sniffs cheap, readily available solvents to starve off hunger, loneliness and fear.

Street children are more often subject to verbal and sexual abuse, neglect, exploitation, or, in extreme cases, murder. In metropolitan cities child 'rental' for begging is a new and increasingly popular phenomenon among poor households. Beggars carrying small children with them in extreme cold or in hot weather around traffic signals are given some money usually in the form of coins as a sympathy to young children. Parents 'rent' their children out to an individual or group and both parties share the child's earnings. The inhumane treatment drives children to drugs and into the hands of criminal gangs who promise protection, food and a better life.

Children are said to be the future of a country. A simple question arises that how can we save the future of our country? Providing food, shelter, education and safety to every child of the country is the responsibility of our government. If our government is not providing such facilities to street children some responsibility also falls on the shoulders of our society. Our society at least can provide such facilities to street children by providing education to street children so at least they may learn to live a healthy life and may be able to earn

some money for themselves in a respectable way.

The students of Development communication and Theories of Communication under supervision of their course incharge Ms. Tahira Tariq developed the idea to provide education to the street children. Due to scare resources it was not possible that street children may be provided education by students or Greenwich University itself.

After a brain storming session it was decided that on self-reliance basis a project with the name of Greenwich University Street Children School Project may be launched in Greenwich University Karachi Campus with an objective to provide basic and primary education to the children of unprivileged class of our society so they may go to school for learning rather than to waste time by roaming in streets and become drug users with drug addicts or team members of gangsters. Children of unprivileged class of society are those children who pass their whole day roaming and playing in the streets nearby their homes. Due to extreme poverty their parent are unable to send them to even government run schools where free education is provided.

Due to limited resources and as initial move from our side a short cut was derived through which pre identified children from unprivileged class of our society will be sent to government run schools. By advocacy campaigns and regular visits if once interest in learning is created such children may be admitted to government run schools to continue their further learning and education. Initially during every semester at least 10-12 such children will be selected for sending to government run schools which will be gradually increased to 10-12 students per month.

Management of the Greenwich University came forward as their social corporate responsibility with a proposal that after students fund generation campaign whatever amount which will be short will be funded by the university.

Ms. Tahira Tariq contacted an NGO which was already working on street children education and welfare. The purpose of contacting the NGO was to save time and resources of our student volunteers in getting whereabouts of street children and to provide them non formal education before their admission to government run schools. Non-formal Education is the educational activity organized outside the formal system of education.

It is simple and flexible and can be delivered at any place convenient to the learners. It is generally designed to meet the basic learning needs of disadvantaged groups and can be availed of at any age'. The services of a proper NGO is also required to ensure proper attendance at schools and for getting progress reports of our admitted children. Our students engaged in their own studies were unable to get proper follow up of the progress and attendance records from government run schools. There must be someone to look after otherwise these children may run from school

and may be on the streets again. IHDF agreed to provide progress reports and attendance records of the street children on monthly basis.

Initiator Human Development Foundation (IHDF) is a nonprofit organization established in 1997 by Mr. Rana Asif 25 Habib. He is President and founder of IHFD. The main objectives of the foundation are: 1) to provide education to street children 2) to support abandoned, orphan and street children and 3) to discourage child labor.

In collaboration with IHDF the project was divided into five different phases and advocacy campaigns were prepared to send the messages to the children and their parents.

Three days initial training of students was the 1st phase of the project. The training was provided by Mr. Rana of IHDF on September 22, 23 and 30, of September, 2018 at Greenwich University.

The objective of the training was to inform the students about UN Convention on the Rights of the Children and the condition of children living and working in different countries of the world. The condition of our street children and different possibilities for their betterment was also discussed. Students were motivated through motivational speeches to come forward and work as volunteer for the Street Children School Project.

During the 2nd Phase of the training session highly motivated 14 students, 9 from the course Theories of Communication and 5 from the course Development Communication were selected as volunteers who were ready to give their time and were willing to work for the project.

This 3rd phase was started after midterm examination for the selection of children who were ready to go to School. Different slump and lower middle class areas were searched with the help of IHDF where poor people live and school going street children were available. Finally Rehman Colony situated behind Igra University in Manzoor Colony was selected. Children with school going age form 4 years to 12 years were selected and their parents were requested for the permission. After several long sessions with the parents and hard work of several days 12 children were granted permission by their parents to join us. As a legal formality consent forms from the parents of selected children were prepared and were signed by the parents permitting us to send their child to school and to use their children's photos and videos for the future campaigns.

The 4th phase was the procurement of documents especially birth certificates which were required for admission in schools and estimation of individual child expenses. The selected children were willing and ready to go to school but their birth certificates were not available as their birth were not recorded in the official records of the concerned department. Birth certificates are required by all government







run schools at the time of giving admission. Further school uniforms, shoes, school bags, water bottles, stationery and lunch boxes were required for the school children along with the birth certificate for admission to school. An estimated cost of all the above mentioned item along with official fee for the birth certificate was around 5,000/ rupees per child.

The 5th phase was the generation of funds for the project which was to be arranged on self-reliance basis by organizing Food Festival and donations. For food festival space was to be provided to vendors on payment of certain amount which will be donated for Street Children School Project. The official slogan of the project decided by students was: "Hath mein hath do, taleem ka sath do".

A fund raising campaign throughout the university was launched to collect funds to purchase school essentials for these children. Social media was also used to promote the cause. A very positive response and appreciation was received on official facebook page of the campaign.

Mr. Shehroz Dossani a student of course Theories of Communication wrote a song in Urdu language and sang for the campaign to encourage people to donate generously for the children of underprivileged class of our society. His song added a musical touch to the on-going drive.

On 27th October 2018 a Food Festival was organized at the campus for fund raising for the street children school project. Famous food outlets Subway, Limca, The White Biryani, DOH, Hugs with Mugs and Jeddah Food Centre participated in the Food Gala. The income earned by providing space to the food outlets was donated for the street children school project.

A large number of students with their friends and faculty visited the Food Gala for lunch and eating and tasting delicious food served by famous food brands. The Mughal family, students, faculty and staff also donated for the project.

On October 28, 2018 students organizing the campaign visited the School Uniforms and school accessories outlets

with selected 12 children for the purchase of uniforms, socks and shoes according to their required sizes. Other school accessories were also purchased for the children. The responsibility for the issuance of birth certificates for the street children was put on the shoulders of Mr. Rana Habib and from the collected donations official fee required for the issuance of birth certificates was paid.

On November 3, 2018 a small ceremony was held at Dr. Kamal Auditorium, Greenwich University, Karachi Campus for the distribution of school essentials to the children and announcement of their admission at government school. News anchor of Abb Takk News, Mr. Fahim Abbasi was invited as a chief guest for the ceremony. A large number of students and faculty attended the ceremony. Prominent electronic and print media was also present to witness the ceremony. Mr. Rana Asif of IHDF, chief guest Fahim Abbas and senior faculty Mr. Iqbal Jamil from the Media Studies Department distributed the gift packs containing school essentials to the street children. Children were very much excited and happy after receiving gifts.

Mr. Rana informed that these children are admitted to two different government schools and after two days they will join school. Ms. Tahira Tariq informed audience that the project enhanced the communication capabilities of our students and practical participation increased their communication capabilities and their ability to communicate effectively. Similarly designing of advocacy campaigns was a part of Development Communication course and various advocacy campaigns were designed in this project to motivate parents to send their children to schools.

Afterwards for the sake of motivation of the street children a tour of the university was organized and different departments were visited by the children. In the end a small certificate distribution ceremony was also held in which appreciation certificates were distributed among students by IHDF which was followed by lunch with the chief guest and the organizers of the project.

KRC-Greenwich University delegate represented Pakistan at 6th Asia-Pacific Forum on Sustainable Development at UNESCAP, Bangkok. The delegate also had the privilege of being part of the closed-meeting with Eminent persons of the UN to reposition and reform ESCAP for enhanced development outcomes across the Asian-pacific region. Some of the excerpts from Ali Jillani's interventions as part of the core recommendations from civil society.



- 1. A Regional Regulatory Mechanism composed of intergovernmental and UN entities should be enacted for a comprehensive review of Trade and Investment agreements to help countries like Pakistan secure policy space in defence of citizens' rights against neo-liberal manoeuvres like ISDS. The entity should also be mandated to help with prevention of illicit financial flows and combating corruption incidence to help reduce inequalities within and among countries.
- 2. In line with the regional roadmap, a regional tax body should be composed to facilitate coherent taxation reforms to enhance human development financing in the region. Other than the global push for mobilizing domestic resources for development, countries like Pakistan should also be supported in navigating macro-economic pressures embodied in conditions of market deregulations, debt-consolidation and austerity measures to avoid massive cuts to key strategic sectors like education, health and standard of living ensuring adequate



fiscal space for social development.

3. Beyond the politics of aid, it is a moral imperative for the international community to recognize that those mainly responsible for climate change should commit the most of their finances and technology required for adaptation and mitigation measures. In line with the Common But Differentiated Responsibilities and Respective Capabilities (CBDRRC) of the Paris Agreement, the developed countries must bear the onus to ensure capacity building, financial support, and technology transfer to the developing countries like Pakistan ranked 7th most vulnerable country - to efficiently cope with climate change.

Ms. Rubina Qaimkhani and SSP Shehla Qureshi

were the guests of the event.

During her student life Ms. Jabbar was shocked over the life of transgender in our country. Transgender can be seen easily at streets and traffic signals begging and living a miserable life. The United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights article number 1 and 5 clearly states that every human must be treated with dignity and have equal rights. In Pakistan we have equal rights for everyone but transgender are deprived of such rights. They are treated badly and humiliation is a part of their daily life. As a student of masters and as a part of her studies she made an extensive re-





search on transgender rights in Pakistan as her final year's thesis and also presented a paper in an International conference under supervision of Miss Tahira Tariq which was highly appreciated by the International community and was one of her big achievements.

The objective of organizing this event was to provide awareness to our students about Human Rights especially the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The main focus of the seminar was transgender rights, women and child rights and what has been done for them so far and how we can improve it in future.

The seminar began with the recitation of the Holy Quran and a short welcome speech by Ms. Aqsa Jabbar who also hosted the event. She informed audience that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights is a historic document which was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly at its 183rd session on 10 December 1948 as Resolution 217 in Paris, France. The adaptation of this declaration was the result of the bad experience of war and severe destruction of humanity during the Second World War.

The most surprising and interesting session of the seminar was the viewing of a short film titled "The Story of Human Rights" especially designed for our event containing 30 award winning public service messages illustrating each of 30 articles of the Universal declaration of Human Rights. This short film helped audience to easily memorize the 30 different human rights within no time and in a very thought-provoking way.

Out first guest speaker was Ms. Rubina Qaimkhani. She is an ex-minister of provincial assembly. She worked as a Parliamentary secretary Ministry of Human Rights. She also worked as Chairperson NA standing committee on Social Welfare and special Education from 2008 till 2010. She is also



known as a social and political activist in interior and urban Sindh. She discussed about the women and children rights and the issues faced by women in our society. She also pointed about the issues related to human rights and its violations. She told that the issues of women have witnessed a rise in the province due to low literacy rate and non-awareness among them about various problems including their health care. She discussed about human rights and the fundamentals on which we can work to help the victims get their rights.

Our second guest speaker was the first woman SP of Karachi, SSP Railway Shehla Qureshi. She shared her experience regarding human rights and women abuse in our society. She spoke about the double standards and discrimination practiced in Pakistan when it comes to gender. There is a sense of shame attached to reporting harassment which is taught to young girls and continues for most of their lives. According to her harassment against women has become very rampant in society and despite this, discussions about it are usually done behind closed doors, if at all. There is a taboo regarding tackling such an issue publicly even though it plagues all women, young and old.

A large number of students, faculty and prominent media attended the seminar and at the end of the seminar Ms. Jabbar offered students if they are willing to work with them and are ready to become advocates for tolerance and peace, they could join her.

Speakers appreciated the efforts of Greenwich University in organizing such seminars and were of the opinion that such programs were necessary to allow people to communicate and discuss their problems. Then only would the country become a more tolerant, accepting and a safe place for all.

A seminar on Environment was held at Greenwich University, Karachi, on November 14, 2018. Prominent experts on different types of Environmental hazards addressed the Seminar.






Presentation of Japanese Acting Ambassador



Dr Farooq Mughal, FCMI, FHEA, FRAI, MCIPD
Assistant Professor (Lecturer) in Strategy and Organization
School of Management, **University of Bath**BA2 7AY, Bath, United Kingdom

Dr Mughal is an organizational sociologist at the School of Management, University of Bath. His research focuses on analysing the future of work, particularly identifying different ways of developing the next generation organization. In this, he takes a holistic view to studying organizations by identifying areas of high leverage in order to sustain competitive advantage. Prior to Bath, he was a postdoctoral research fellow at Lancaster University Management School from where he also completed his doctorate in management learning and masters in human resources and consulting. Dr Mughal also holds an MBA in HRM (Gold Medallist) and a BSc in IT (Gold Medallist) from Greenwich University. He has also consulted for leading organisations and corporations around the world, including the Barclays plc, United States Agency for International Development (USAID), Asia Foundation, ActionAid, Daresbury Science and Innovation Park, Commission on Science and Technology for the Sustainable Development in South and the Pakistani Government.

Apart from his academic qualifications, Dr Mughal is a Fellow of the Chartered Management Institute (CMI),

Fellow of the Higher Education Academy (HEA), Fellow (elec) Royal Anthropological Institute (RAI) and a Member of the Chatered Institute of Personnel and Development (CIPD). He serves on the editorial board of Action Learning (Research & Practice) journal and the reviewer boards for prestigious journals including the Academy of Management Learning & Education, Studies in Higher Education, Human Resource Development International and Management Learning. He is also a visiting researcher at the IESE Business School in Barcelona and Istanbul Business School. His most recent work on Reduced Load Work Arrangements in Organizations and Internship Learning in Placement Organizations has been presented at prestigious conferences including the Academy of Management 2019 in Boston and the International CMS Conference in Milton Keynes 2019. Dr Mughal remains an active member of the British Academy of Management and the Association for North American Higher Education International. He has made several public appearnes at prestigious conferences, workshops and seminars in the UK, USA, Spain, Turkey and Pakistan.



Greenwich University (GU): Kindly introduce yourself.

Dr Farooq Mughal (DFM): I am an academic working at the School of Management, University of Bath UK currently ranked number 4th in the United Kingdom. The school of management is a top 100 business school as noted in the QS World Rankings. My role encompasses teaching, research and consulting work where I make use of my academic and professional skills as an organizational sociologist — a theorist who seeks to identify different ways for developing the next generation of organizations in an increasingly changing world of work.

(GU): Briefly share your journey to the present position of organizational sociologist, University of Bath.

(DFM): The journey to becoming a non-native, foreign, academic working at a prestigious university in the UK has been quite challenging. Growing up, I never imagined I would be teaching future leaders from all over the globe and working with management gurus on wicked organizational problems. After completing my secondary school towards the late 90's, I thought to become a medical doctor, so I pursued a pre-medical route in my higher secondary school in Pakistan. However, my interest soon faded as I saw my colleagues, who were more intelligent and smarter than I was, struggling to get into medical colleges and universities. Like every other young youth, I switched my career plans. In 2001, there was an IT boost in Pakistan, I became inclined towards technology and computing. I sought to pursue a dream career in the IT industry which led to undertaking an undergraduate degree (BS) in IT at Greenwich University. With the fall of the IT industry towards the mid 2000's I again switched my track to management and business administration. I thought to take up an MBA degree at Greenwich University given the strong industry links the university had. During my MBA, I had an opportunity to perform some work for an advertising agency, an NGO and a tech firm in Islamabad. After the completion of my MBA, I briefly taught at a higher educational institution in Pakistan before leaving to pursue a specialized master's degree in HR and consulting at Lancaster University, UK. During my time at Lancaster, I interacted with some of the well-known academics in management and organization studies. As I grew in confidence, my ideas further developed. Now I had developed interest in pursuing a PhD degree. Seeking funding was quite challenging, given the cost of education in the UK. I also happened to land a PhD admission at Cambridge University's Judge Business School. However, the area of management learning and leadership was more well renowned at Lancaster which also provided me with a funding opportunity to complete my thesis. I also taught at Lancaster as part of my funding and in my role as a teaching associate. After completing my doctorate in 2016, I was offered a position as postdoctoral research fellow at the Academy of Gender, Work and Leadership, a research center of Lancaster University where I worked on a Global Challenges Research Fund (GCRF) project on enhancing the entrepreneurial capacity of women in Ghana and a Barclays commissioned project on enhancing the visibility of women leaders in the board room under their cultural transformation initiative. Thereafter, I saw an opportunity to become a full-time academic at the University of Bath and things started to fall in place.

(GU): How has been your experience of exploring and researching organizational studies, if you could share with us.

(DFM): Researching organizations as a critical scholar is quite complex and challenging. Unlike the way organizations are presented as neatly organized spaces of work in textbooks, they are in fact messy places riddled with politics, paradoxes, ambiguities, complexities and continuous change. Through my research work, I have come to understand that working in organizations is inherently a political act, which can elevate emotionality and sensitivity within the workplace. Effectively managing and leading such workplaces involves a sense making process of the pain or pressure points of all stakeholders involved in the being and becoming of an organization.

My work becomes trickier as I try to study the interoperability of power of how power operates at different levels in organizations particularly knowing that these are emotionally and politically charged places. When I walk into workplaces and tell people that I study power and politics, they run away. In other words, this means that these elements of power and politics stay there with us, but we don't really want to talk about them. I term power as Lord Voldemort from the fictional character and the main antagonist in the JK Rowling series, 'Harry Potter' — he-who-must-not-be-named. Now you might know how it's like to work as a critical scholar in the field of organization studies.



(GU): How and when did you come up with the idea of conducting research on this topic, rather what piqued your interest?

(DFM): That's a great question. There has been a decades old debate around the divide between theory and practice. We always hear people say that what you read in textbooks is not really what happens in the real world. Well, that's true and the problem is that as academic we are too reliant on theories whose application is miles away from reality and as practitioners we are never willing to frame practice (or real world problems) from a theoretical viewpoint. I take a holistic perspective to studying organizations and organizational practice which aims to overcome this divide between theory and practice. One way of doing this is through assuming an alternate view of reality which questions the taken for granted assumptions which are never really taught in classrooms. These don't need to be work experiences but everyday life experiences that we encounter and believe me every work place reflects these experiences and emotions. It's only about how you make sense of these.

(GU): What assistance can academic institutions provide in this 3 dimensional study?

(DFM): Again, a great question. Charity begins at home. As academics, if we are unable to visualize workplaces as messy and complex spaces, we will unable to overcome this divide between management theory and practice. Over the years, I have seen many academics continuing to reinforce their worldview of management as some kind of 'science' that neatly compartmentalizes management practice into boxes or paradigms. Then use textbooks to offer prescriptions as if they could be applied in real life contexts. This is called 'functional stupidity' — a term coined by Mats Alvesson and Andre Spicer in their most recent book. If academics and academic institutions continue to sway from reality this will likely to produce young talents and minds who are not ready for assuming real

world responsibilities. This is will cause organizational collapses, financial meltdowns, unsustainable management fads and toxic forms of managerial and leadership philosophies. It's time that we move on from our over reliance on Westernized textbooks and embrace our own ways of managing organizations and produce research which has implications for the Pakistani society.

(GU): How can managers or leaders in Pakistan change their organizations for the changing future of work?

(**DFM**): I think culture plays a critical role in how organizations are developed in Pakistan. It is imperative for Pakistani organizations to understand their DNA and then initiate relevant strategies, programmes and projects. Once managers and leaders understand the different external and internal elements that impact the organization's culture, only then they are successfully able to develop organizations. There are three layers to culture as noted by Edgar Schein: Artifact – the topmost and visible layer consists of observable elements of an organization which distinguish it from others e.g. layout, structure or physical environment; Espoused Values - philosophies that are unique to organizations; and Basic Assumptions – the taken for granted beliefs. We can easily change artifacts and espoused values but it is quite difficult to change basic assumptions as they are often embodied forms of practice. The change needs to come from this level and move upwards to influence other layers of the organization.

(GU): Please give example of your initiatives over the past one year that has resulted in tangible societal growth in UK.

(DFM): Amongst many initiatives, I would like to talk about some of my most recent research work around skills gap and the challenges to graduate employability in the UK. Internship learning and placements are becoming a way to bridge the gap between theory and practice, particularly in ensuring that students are work ready by the time they enter the employment stage. Along with colleagues from Lancaster University, we are currently developing a framework to help business schools, industry and government to facilitate student transition and crossover from the safety of the classroom to the workplace. While on their internships and placements, these students are placed in a liminal or the 'in-between' space and our work is helping them to overcome the reality shock and assume responsibility of their own careers.

(GU): What is the biggest challenge faced by higher education in the Pakistan?

(DFM): I think the biggest challenge faced by higher education in Pakistan, apart from the economic and financial barriers, is the lack of producing research which has implications for organizations and society. Scholars in mainstream sciences, engineering and technology are producing research which is mostly applied in nature whereas academics in social sciences including business and management are unfortunately engaging in a number game, falling victim to undue pressures of

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publications. My rule is simple, if you are unable to translate your research into practice and create impact, then you must rethink your scholarship.

(GU): Who is your inspiration in life?

(DFM): Undoubtedly, my father (Prof. Dr. A. Q Mughal) has been my inspiration to becoming an academic. Watching him devote his life to education and the betterment of society has been a major source of motivation. But this is just part of who I am, whereas without the prayers of my mother (Mrs. Raina Mughal) I wouldn't have been able to achieve anything. Parents are like total institutions, they take you in, they nurture you and provide the basis for flying high. I will always be thankful to them for showing me the power of knowledge and sharing their lifelong wisdom.

(GU): How did you overcome the obstacles you faced on the road to success?

(DFM): It has been a difficult road to success. During my PhD, I had fallen ill, and my wife Aneesa took on the responsibility of supporting and healing me, but most importantly believing in me. For it is her support, when the days were dark and hope was fading away, which made me believe that everything was possible. She sacrificed her own PhD's time to allow me to complete my thesis. And, my daughter Zuha whose hugs filled my heart with happiness when I felt blue and provided me with a new sense of determination. My earnest thanks to my family: my parents who taught me how to make it possible and my wife who made it possible!

(GU): How do you maintain balance between your personal and professional life?

(DFM): As an academic at a leading UK institution, maintaining a healthy work-life balance is quite difficult. The pressure to publish in high quality and prestigious journals as well as teaching classes of more than 240 students from all over the world are challenging tasks. I think this is one area where I need to work on.

(GU): Could you please name a person who has left a tremendous impact on your life?

(DFM): I am deeply influenced by the works of French philosopher Pierre Bourdieu who has left a tremendous impact on my development as an academic. Bourdieu's work has primarily been concerned with the dynamics of power in society, especially the diverse and subtle ways in which power is transferred and social order is maintained within and across generations. Taking after Bourdieu, I have utilized his worldview to investigate organizations and management practices to make sense of the complexity of workspaces.

(GU): What is one goal either personal or professional that you would like to accomplish?



(**DFM**): Professionally there are many goals that I would like to accomplish during my career, but personally I would like to be a good father, a good husband, a good son and a good sibling.

(GU): What gives you contentment and satisfaction?

(DFM): Watching my work as a Pakistani being acknowledge, appreciated and published in World leading journals.

(GU): What has been the biggest disappointment in your career?

(DFM): Life is a wealth of opportunities and possibilities. There have been many paths that I could have taken, but I am quite content on the decisions I've made in life. So far, I have no regrets.

(GU): What fuels your drive to success?

(DFM): To inspire and motivate others.

(GU): A memory from your educational life that is close to your heart?

(DFM): Time spent in the company of good friends at Greenwich.

(GU): Do you follow any peculiar golden rule for life?

(DFM): Never give up.

(GU): Your message for the youth of our country.

(DFM): We must overcome the oppression of thought by developing the ability to critically reflect and think about our everyday life experiences and question the taken for granted assumptions that enslave us.


Students also set up stalls of snacks and drinks catering to the taste buds of the audience.

Greenwich University (GU): Okay so tell me about your poetry collection first of all, it was your first publication?

Taha Kehar (T K): Yes it was. I don't consider myself much of a poet anymore, I started writing when I was 15 as you mentioned and poetry was what I resorted to and I enjoyed the form, I liked the way it flowed, it came naturally to me when I was younger. Teenagers have a higher proclivity to dabble in poetry so maybe that's what inspired me. I think I made the mistake of actually publishing it which I think it was received relative well and people appreciated it. In fact, back in 2012 I had my launch at this very venue. So, it was called Writing Words with Fire and it was a collection of 36 -37 poems. Primarily they were poems inspired by the modernist tradition and there was an evolution within them you know, it went into political verses, and I personally enjoy my political verses maybe they were shaping basis for what I would write later on. That was Writing Words with Fire. I also worked on a second poetry collection which I had self-published and it did okay it got a good review here and there, but I don't acknowledge my history of the poetry form.

(GU): How long did it take you to write your first book?

(T K): My first novel? I started writing my first novel when I was seventeen and a half, I was done with the first draft by

the time I was nineteen so that is a year and a half. It wasn't published until four years later so I worked on it consistently and it took me some time.

(GU): Did it require a lot of editing by your publishers?


(T K): My first novel was published by a publishing house in India it's called Palimpsest it's a smaller publication and we went through multiple drafts not because of the editing but I was not comfortable with the way it was written. Because when you write at 19, when you write at 20 there is a vast difference in discovering your voice your trying to update your voice accordingly so I took my time with it and my publisher was nice enough to let me do that. When Typically Tanya went about the updates I was 27 years old and that novel also flowed very naturally. I started writing when I was 25, I finished it when I was 26 and it was published when I was around 27.

(GU): So of Rifts and Rivalries was your first novel and Typically Tanya came in second?

(T K): Yes that's correct.

(GU): Are you working on anything at the moment?

(TK): Yes, I am actually I am working on this novel I am almost, I am not going to say I am done because novels take years but



this one seems to be flowing quiet naturally. It's based on a woman who is dying and she doesn't want a funeral, she wants a party instead. And its set in Karachi so there is bound to be many raised eyebrows about something like that. But it intrigued me the idea because there was so much scope for where it will go.

(GU): Is it fictional or is it based on someone real?

(T K): Its fictional. I don't like to say that anything is based on fiction or reality. I think fiction is an amalgam of reality and your own imagination. Whereas in Typically Tanya - because I worked as a journalist for almost 5 years and two publications — people thought I had written about myself but only I had morphed myself into a woman and I wouldn't say that either because I don't write autobiography.

(GU): Tell me more about this new character? This woman you're writing about.

(T K): This woman is actually a writer herself, she is in her 50s. There is a history to her life and a city like Karachi which obviously she comes from a privileged set of society but she has experienced a lot of trauma a lot of distress. So, it borders on a kind of mystery thriller which I don't think I ever wanted to write ever in my life actually, but it's emerging like that. It had a very literary beginning and it morphed into a slight mystery. So, there is an element of mystery to her character which I am looking forward to exploring.

(GU): Are there any antagonists in the book or is she the main focus?

(T K): All my characters are protagonists and antagonist that's the thing. Even when Typically Tanya when it was published people in Pakistan were not very pleased because they were not used to seeing a woman in a role that was maybe more mainstream. Because Tanya has a good side and a bad side and she is able to balance the two in her own way. It could be in tentative it could be it depends on your interpretation, but they were not happy because they were not used to seeing an antagonist assume a role of a protagonist — because she was so unlikable to them. But I like to believe every character has a streak of likeability and unlikability, we are human at the

end of the day. We are good that way we have our dull moments and our generous moments. We are charitable, we are caring but we are also not very nurturing at the same time and we can actually put people down and that's the reality of how society is.

(GU): Can you tell me a little more about Of Rift and Rivalries?

(T K): Of Rift and Rivalries was a book I wrote when I was much younger it's very different stuff from what I am writing right now. It was basically the premise was partition but not partition at the time but the impact of partition. So, I followed the story of this one family that's based in Karachi again a privileged set of people. I wouldn't call them elite but relatively well-to-do. It follows the story of two brothers who are trying to understand their family history and it takes through various flashbacks to 1947, 1960s, 1970s, the story of their grandparents, the story of their parents. It is primarily just more historical than it is anything else. Typically Tanya was more contemporary and I think this is (referring to his current work) is contemporary as well.

(GU): How was Of Rift and Rivalries received in India not in Pakistan but in India?

(T K): I think it was received quiet well. Both my books were received very well in India because I primarily published in India, marketed better in India. Of Rift and Rivalries was particularly acclaimed, it got a lot of good reviews. Actually, Pakistani news outlets also liked it a lot. Typically Tanya got great reviews in India and it did relatively better than Of Rift and Rivalries. But I think Of Rift and Rivalries was a bit more tribute so the response was more sophisticated.

(GU): Are you a full-time writer or do you have a day job?

(T K): So I used to be journalist from 2014 until 2019 February. I used to work at the Express Tribune and I used to head the Peshawar city pages and the books edition -they used to take out a bi-monthly books page and then I went onto The News and I used to work on the opinion's pages then. Then I just decided in February that I need to become a full-time writer. Because I think Tanya's response was relatively good, I thought it was important that I think writers need to take a hiatus every now and again. I don't have a full-time job anymore I teach briefly. I teach media students at Bahria University, I teach them current affairs. I think it's good to have a day job because it really balances the unpredictability's you encounter as a writer.

(GU): Would you teach creative writing or fictional writing?

(T K): I wouldn't mind but at the end of the day as a writer, teaching is such a huge responsibility. You have class of 20-25 students aspiring writers who want your feedback, your input and young people tend to be restless about feedback. They want to be published and sometimes I feel I have to get myself a few more books - a few more years of just learning the craft before I can actually say with certainty this is how you do it



this is how you don't do it. Because it is easy to get swayed by your teachers' sentiments and sometimes the teacher can tell you it's a terrible piece and that is the most publishable piece you could have ever written so it's important.

(GU): How do you get your ideas what inspires you?

(T K): I rely on life experiences. I personally feel like the fiction I enjoy is more realistic. I can talk about politics, I enjoy politics I sometimes weave politics into my work. Typically Tanya has a lot of political commentary in conversations. Of Rift and Rivalries is based on history and this one that I am writing currently is less political but it's based on society and just things that happen around me. So, I would say the things that inspire me is living and experiencing things. I could even make this one conversation with you I could tell you a few ideas and this I could make it as a setting for a novel as well but that is how it is. Because I believe fiction it mirrors your society it mirrors your reality and it's important to talk about it. The reality that is in fiction.

(GU): As you have seen this generation they don't read as much as we used to do. Do you have a comment on that?

(T K): Interestingly enough people read but they read and they don't understand. Literature has a humanizing influence it's supposed to make you understand people who don't have the access to it or people who are very much unlike you. But I feel people who read these days and then they go on Goodreads and then comment on Goodreads, I feel Goodreads is a platform that maybe encourages you to read by making it a challenge by making it something that is appealing. But I feel the individual reader the young reader isn't able to empathize with characters. Therefore, you see a lot of Goodreads reviews that clearly show that the reader has not understood a book.

You don't see these on my books but you see this on a lot of other people's books as well – I didn't get this I didn't understand this. I think reading is something that requires you to have a more as I said humanizing effect it civilizes you. When it comes to people not reading; I think it's important to pick up a book. I know a lot of writers who don't read. Who don't read because they think that it's going effect their words influence their book when they use things that are; borrowed. When any creative writing professor will tell you that any story you want to write has already been written. So, what is the point of influence it doesn't do you any good – your voice is different and that is what makes the story different. So, I think reading is fundamentally important and reading with a little bit more humanity

(GU): Would you ever consider writing anything non-fiction?

(T K): My job was non-fiction so I write I am a freelance interpreter every now and then so I write for a lot of publications the Express Tribune in Sunday and primarily that is all non-fiction writing is, it's journalistic work at the same time. I also write a lot of book reviews a lot of literally analysis as well. So, if I were to take this further yes, I may, but I believe if I were to write a heavy tome, non-fiction that is; I would require a lot of research and research requires time and I don't think I have that kind of time.

(GU): Have you read a Sensational Life of Quandeel Baloch? Would you consider writing something like that?

(T K): I wouldn't mind. Sanam Meher did something very smart and courageous, actually. She capitalized on an idea and she was able to furnish a narrative around it. The beauty of it is that she claims she doesn't understand the story even now so that gives me a little bit of hope because my only concern has always been, if I pick an issue or like a personality let's take Sabeen (Mahmud) right there I would have to understand that story I always wanted to understand it. So, I would do it if I have enough evidence if I have enough research to back my claim. At this point I filled him on the book written with chapters in Urdu, English and Sindhi a collaboration by various writers called Candle in the Wind, on Sabeen Mahmud.

(GU): So if you were to write a whole book on it? how would you get started on the process? how would you go about it? Primarily talk about the person she was. There is a difference between the public figure and the person she was and these differences need to be understood. I would probably focus more on the murder even the journalist in me wants to know a little bit more interested on that aspect. Then I would more interested in the work she's done or the influences that shaped her. Because that would be more interesting to me than the mainstream understanding of her because I work in the realm of fiction so my idea for characterization is what

(GU): Do you have any advice for future writers?

makes a person what they are.

(T K): Write what you know write also what you don't know

because anything can work out. Literature is generally a gamble at the end of the day, it's about persistence, it's about understanding different things in different ways; sometimes its writing and not knowing where it's going but it teaches you a lot of lessons about what you should do and what you should-68 n't do so just keep writing. There will be a time when writers will turn and look and say you're not good enough (written work) or a teacher will say you're not good enough but it's important to soldier on because your voice didn't learn your ideas didn't learn so it's important for that kind of thing.

(GU): Why do you think Pakistani writers get published in India but local publishers don't do anything for them?

(TK): It is very ironic. Because when I was shopping for Writing Words with Fire my poetry collection the Pakistani publishing houses, they insisted there was no market for it. They told me things like pre-publication orders and I had no idea what that was, and even a publisher like OUP (Oxford University Press) is just reluctant to publish it as they keep comparing it with their text books, the sales of their text books are much higher obviously because schools are buying them. Not because people are not buying fiction it's just schools are not buying the kind of fiction that is published. And I think the problem is that we don't understand the importance of fiction to our society. And publishers that have tended to publish fiction have always struggled later on because they just don't seem to recognize that there is a way to go about it. You can't just throw something out there and say its fiction, because we don't have the editing skills or the infrastructure facilities to actually facilitate a fictional writer. In addition to that the irony was when Typically Tanya was published it got pirated in Pakistan so why was it pirated when there was no market for it? Obviously, piracy is a business as well so there has to be a few people who want it which is why it's been pirated. So, it makes no sense to me. I think publishing is a massive rethink in our society. We also don't have very many publishers I think Shandana Minhas has started something called Mongrel books in 2016-2017, she published two books the quality of those books was I wouldn't call terrible because they were good quality but I felt paper quality suffered, the cover was not that good, the editing was not very good, so there is a lot that goes into the book and as I mentioned we don't have the infrastructure development or the facilities for that.

(GU): Who is your go to person when you finish writing do you show it to someone before you hunt for publishers?

(T K): So, every book has been a very different process altogether. With my first novel I had no one around so I decided I would edit it myself and I would shop it around to publishers so that was one process. Then I would start showing it to my publishers - any new draft. With Typically Tanya I did the same thing but I shared with an agent. Now with this book I have multiple readers even though it's not even done yet. I have a friend, Amir Hussain he lives in London he reads it. I think you become a bit more confident about your work as time comes, and then I have a few friends here and there who are willing to read it but I think that is the most important thing it's good

to have readers who can give you the motivation. I don't know I think the most important thing you can do when you are starting a project is to show it to a reliable reader.

(GU): I asked him what a reliable reader was?

Suppose you showed me something and I said this was thrash you have just put your heart and soul into something and your crushed because you say this is your life's work and you know how can it be your life's work? you feel that? sometimes it's important to go to someone who can guide you...you know this is right and this is wrong, or this makes sense this doesn't so there is always a pinch of salt that goes with these things so it's important to understand any kind of feedback is good feedback you take everything with a pinch full of salt.

(GU): Is there anything you would like to tell the students of Greenwich who are considering writing as a career?

(TK): Read, write and never give up. Because that's the most important thing we don't have the right infrastructure here but there is a thriving literature community and we have a literary canon that is starved for new verses so upon that it's important to keep writing.

(GU): What do you read?

(TK): I try to read South-Asian fiction because I think it's important to know what other people are writing and what other people are reading and writing. I like to read more dramatic fiction. Recently I tried to work with mystery fiction it didn't work out; I don't have the knack for it. Primarily I enjoy books about South Asia.

(GU): Anything in particular?

I like Arundhati Roy's God of Small Things and the next book Ministry of Utmost Happiness. Although many people didn't like it, I loved it. I have favourite among American authors Armistead Maupin, he wrote these Tales of the City novels which is set in San Francisco. Yes, it's been made into a drama but his novels have been going on from 1977 onwards. So, the drama that is on Netflix is an adaption of that - he didn't write that. These are though his characters. So, I have been reading up a lot it was actually an out-of-body- experience questions about your identity and perspective.

(GU): Would you consider writing a screenplay or a play about Typically Tanya?

(T K): A play about Typically Tanya. Hmmm...I don't know I often talk about it I think other people should do it because if I want to see something, I have written about on screen I would be very critical. I would much rather watch Typically Tanya written directed by somebody else. I will have a grandfatherly approach to it that would be much more appealing.

Thank you I think that's about it.
