The partition of British India in 1947 saw Kashmir as a cynosure of all eyes while Pakistan & India have been fighting over Kashmir for nearly 7 decades. Kashmir possesses high value in terms of geography, national security, and also resources and that's the root cause for this ongoing conflict. It plays a key role in the CPEC as well as Belt & Road initiative.

In order to limit the Indian central government's power over Jammu & Kashmir, Article 370 was put into place, which was later abrogated by the government in order to gain complete control over the disputed territory. There has been wide-

Considering February 5th, 2021, Umer Khan hosted a show on Greenwich Web TV, showing solidarity with the people of Kashmir. In a state with massive UDHR violations, there needs to be a voice heard, no matter how faint. Mr Ali Jillani, Vice Chair, Karachi Research Chair shed light on the importance to understand the causes of the conflict, and the need for the historic Partition of India to be referenced. He also highlighted the momentous historical blunders which were made

The guest speaker of the show **Mr Munir Alam**, an engineer turned teacher who is striving to save future of Kashmir. **“Children in Indian-controlled Kashmir are no strangers to lockdowns they are all part of growing up in one of the world’s most militarized zones”** Said Munir. He talked about his effort and said “for the last three months, sitting in the

house was disturbing. The students were worried about their studies and their future. He says that there has been a period of stone-pelting and curfew in Jammu and Kashmir since 2008, but the Valley did not face such a difficult situation in the past.” He is the fighter who is fighting against terrorism, ignorance and hatred. It was a pleasure to have a voice all the way from Kashmir.

Four of our SDC Societies of Greenwich University collaborated to show the solidarity and support to Kashmir.

A heartrending poetic rendition, about the sacrifices and affliction of Kashmiris, was delivered by the Literary Society members, under the mentorship of Ms Nadia Kaleem.

The Performing Arts Society & Diplomatic Society, under the mentorship of **Ms Anum Naz Durrani & Mr Ali Raza Shah Jillani** respectively, came up with the idea of a United Nations Security Council (UNSC) simulation. This replication showed various country representatives who put forward their stance on the Kashmir

issue. Various countries included were, Kashmir, China, India, Pakistan, Russia, USA, UK, and Turkey while the meeting was presided over a neutral South Africa. Each country spoke about what they could do for Kashmir and whether they were in support of the abrogation of Article 370 and how the reign of Narendra Modi was one of terrors rather than peace.

As a nation, we hope that Kashmir can finally say **“My chains are gone, I’ve been set free”**. An uneasy stalemate has prevailed for decades now and both India and Pakistan do not seem to be backing down any time soon.

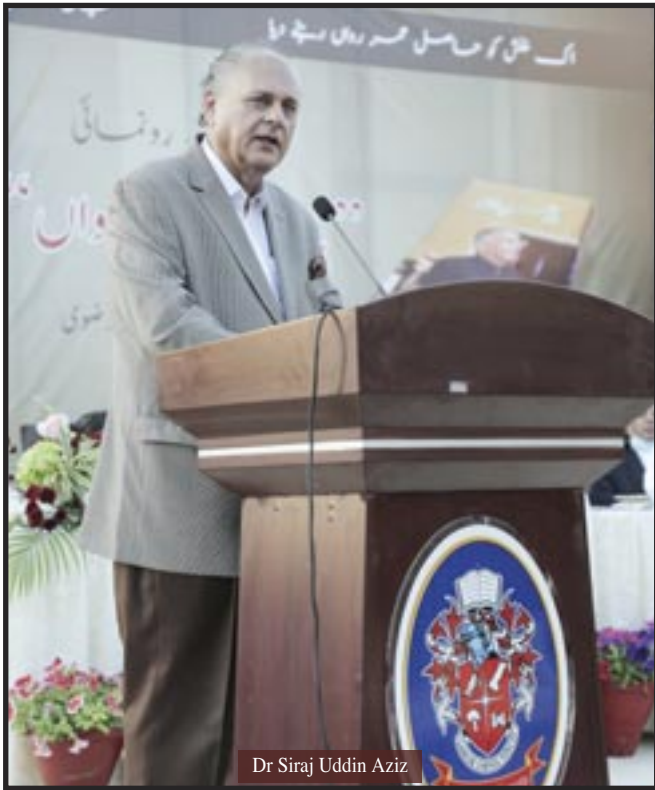

Webinar on
“Climate Change in South Asia;”
Way Forward for Equity and Justice Informed Governance



Ali Raza Jillani, Vice Chair, Karachi Research Chair, Greenwich University, represented Pakistan at the World Social Forum 2021 webinar on "Climate Change in South Asia; Way Forward for Equity and Justice Informed Governance". The Panel was moderated by India featuring speakers from Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and Nepal. The Global Sustainable Development Report 2019 highlighted the absence of data on over 60% of the environmental indicators, with several countries experiencing regressive patterns in climate governance in the Asian Pacific region. Three out of the five most endangered countries by climate change come from South Asia, while the entire region is confronted by severe air & water pollution and biodiversity loss.

Mr. Jillani criticized the report for not covering corporate capture of the environment and natural resource base, continuously exploited for profiteering tactics where extraction, processing and use of fossil fuels (oil, gas and coal) along with the energy infrastructure continues to inflict irreversible damage to the environment. And, the monopolized policy space through neoliberal trade agreements continues to sustain the use of fossil fuels at the expense of people and the planet. The privatization of public goods in the name of ecosystem service or value addition continues to exacerbate deprivations of the most acute nature. The report does not expose the persecution of environmental defenders nor stresses the need to democratize the discourse around climate governance.

Mr. Jillani proposed the following recommendations for redress:

- 1) Multilateral systems must protect the inviolability of Global Environmental Commons (GECs) through stronger

public sector commitment, appropriate policies e.g. Polluters Pay Act, Progressive Carbon Taxation, Removal of Fossil subsidies, among others.

- 2) Retrogressive taxation regime should be enacted for corporations mainly responsible for Green House Gases (GHG) emissions (like Exxon and Shell) to finance developing countries requiring estimated \$75 billion/year by 2030 to cope with climate change.
- 3) Paris Agreement should entwine Climate Public Expenditure and Institutional Review (CPEIR) with Official Development Assistance (ODA) reporting to track Global North commitment in financial, technical and technological support for developing countries.
- 4) A Regional entity should be established under the auspices of United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEA/P) in coordination with the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP) to provide policy coherence guidance to Environmental and Social Impact Assessment Agencies (ESIAs) at the national levels. It could enhance governmental efficiency in holding multinational corporations accountable for environmental degradation notwithstanding the Investor State Dispute Settlement (ISDS) maneuver. The entity could also revitalize centuries-old indigenous knowledge systems combined with modern scientific evidence to challenge the dominant regimes of knowledge, like corporate funded think tanks, involved in climate dissuasion.
- 5) Beyond the politics of aid, it is a moral imperative that those predominantly responsible for climate change must commit the most of finances, technology and technical resources required for mitigation and adaptation measures under Paris Agreement's Common But Differentiated Responsibilities and Respective Capabilities (CBDRRC) clause.

He stressed the need to start questioning the absence of political will in climate governance that could lead to catastrophic implications for our collective future.

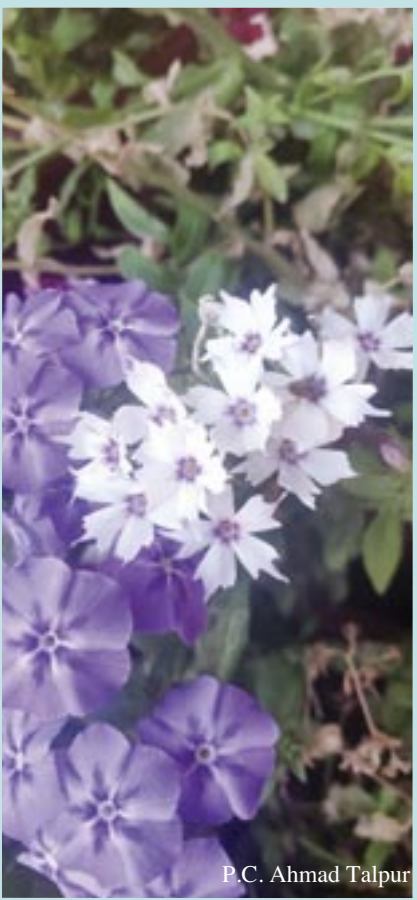

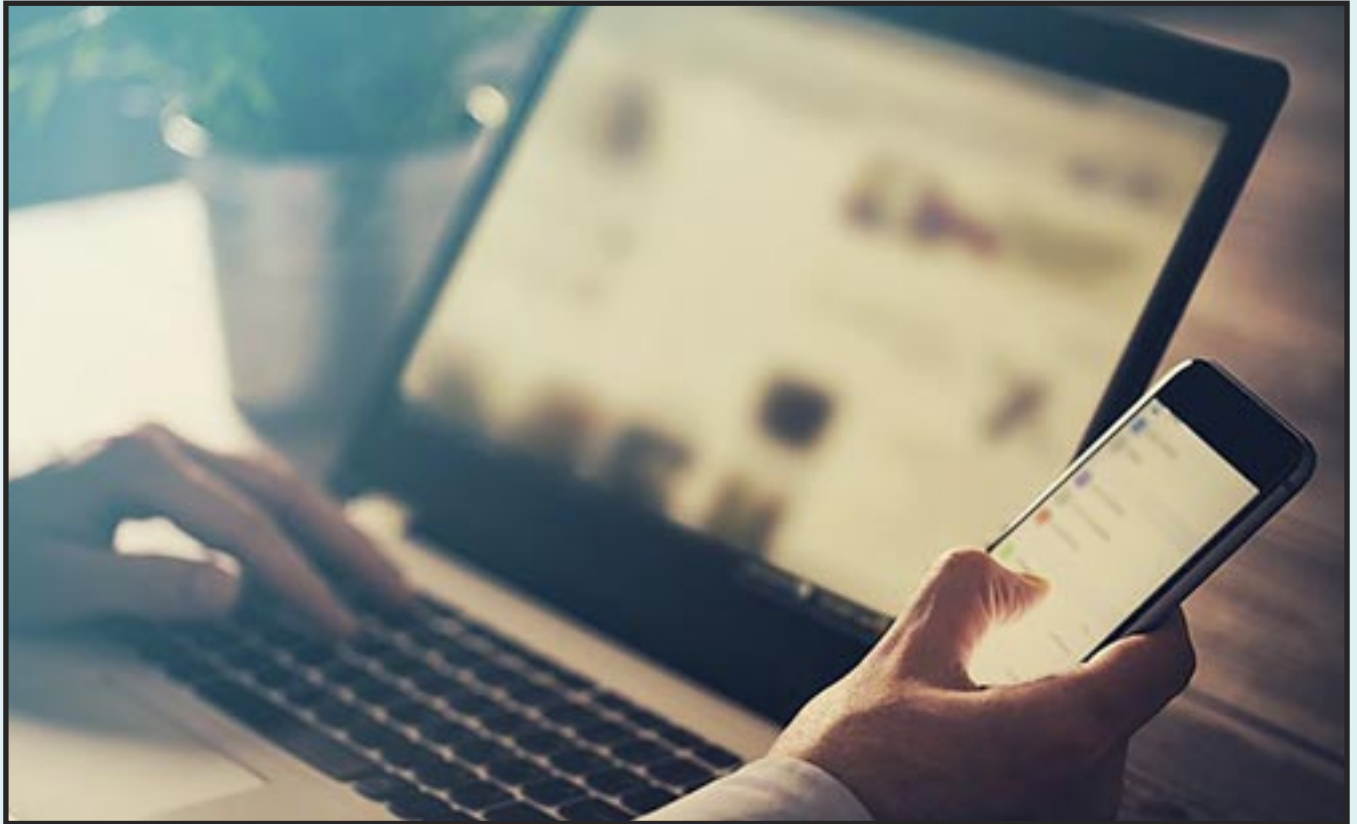

Greenwich University (GU) : What is the role of GU in your life?

Mohsin Shafique (MS) : Greenwich helped me a lot when I got into practical life and it basically was the force of motivation that we had. I studied entrepreneurship from **Shameel Murad** and **Sarim Alvi**, who were CEO's back in they shared their experiences how things work out in the market and that all helped me throughout the journey.

GU: Any milestone that you want to cherish when you look back?

MS: Milestone would be, first I was doing job while I was completing my BBA, with that I got a small opportunity that was of a cafeteria at Cedar College so that was sort of something new to me and that time people criticized me that **“you are planning to run a canteen”** I had a good job I was studying and was about to graduate. People usually choose easy way out but for me this cafeteria was a big milestone and it was one of the game changers from which Angeethi emerged. It's been almost 6 years I have been running Canteens that include cedars 5 campuses, school colleges etc. We started Angeethi in pandemic and still we are doing good

and our hard work payed off.

GU: What is the definition of happiness for Mohsin? How far do you think you have achieved this idea of happiness in your life?

MS: If you would have asked me this question 5 years back I would say the satisfaction for me would be money, but as we grow up we get mature, I got married its been years now and have a kid too, so obviously priorities change and with time you realize money is not everything and Alhumdulillah today I ucomprehend success as satisfaction, the workers that I have, how satisfied they are and that is something which is bigger than money for me, so for me satisfaction is the growth of my workers and with that definitely every other day I am growing too. Everything is aligned for me **“give respect take respect”** and that's what my life motive is.

GU: What are some of the mistakes that you wish you would have avoided?

MS: Back A-levels I was somebody who wasn't into studies more so I wasted almost year and half in deciding which university I should opt for, back never thought time would

matter this much but now I do realize that I should have utilized that time in a better way and I might have started “Angeethi” way before, but that’s how it is that you learn from your mistakes. I was always confused about where to study abroad or here so the year I wasted is the mistake I made.

GU: What is that one memory of Greenwich that you can recall and would cherish for lifetime?

MS: The past experiences that I had in Greenwich mainly with the faculty, I still recall there were teachers who were completely different in their own way its more like I don’t call them teacher’s but family for example ‘**Mr. Ali Saeed, Mr. Sarim Alvi & Mr. Shamy Mooraj** and few more, they all were like friends, you can just walk towards them and talk about anything.

GU: When and how you had this idea of Angeethi in your mind?

MS: Since I was running a canteen in Cedar and we were providing them everything like BBQ and stuff.

The idea was, start something after 5 pm, and I visited a famous restaurant and saw that they were providing stuff in an improved environment.

GU: How bad COVID hit Angeethi, as you had to face it since its inception?

MS: It was struggle, it took us good 6 months from deciding everything to making it operational. We had to train the chef’s and the staff about presentation, service and quantity.

We have been growing throughout even in COVID times and Alhumdulillah we are now soon opening our second branch at Tipu Sultan road after Ramzan.

GU: How do you build you team or how do you keep your team members motivated?

MS: This industry totally relies on manpower, you cannot replace that with machinery at all and the loyalty matters a lot. Recently I along with all my staff went for PSL match, sit together we eat together, and we keep going along with





each other, keeping it all friendly and stuff.

GU: We always learn from our failures, did you face any failure that too changed something in your life?

MS: Initial program at cedar was to open Chinese restaurant but it ended up with a failure and at that point I thought of opening Angeethi. I have been into family business too, went to office for good 1-2 years but I wasn't satisfied with it I always wanted to do something on my own, wanted to take risk and I was lucky enough to have a supportive family who put their faith in me and I went for this initiative. Started from zero plus many people said it won't last long but Alhumdulillah it all went well.

GU: What makes you different, who is Mohsin today?

MS: Well I am a street-smart person and Greenwich played a role in it where I learned how to understand people and practical world, that helps me in running my business. Usually I keep a direct interaction with my customers that plays an important role too and I have this quality out of three partners.

GU: Did you face any embarrassing experience with your customers?

MS: I have been through a lot of stuff like that, I am the one who is down making reservations at the time of waiting,

people want. Sometimes you have bad days, sometime people appreciate you and sometimes not, but it's like a daily thing too.

GU: Is there any one advice that you want to give to our upcoming Entrepreneurs?

MS: Learn from your failures, keep working hard every day and you need to be committed and honest towards your work, no matter how small or how big the work is. I started from a canteen and I am here today, people would make fun of you but its you and your dedication towards your work that must remain intact. With in a time span of a year or so I was able to get my own car. Take risks you might fail once but don't give up, Always stay humble and that's what keeps you going in a long run.

GU: Lastly, where do you see yourself in next 5 years, do you have anything in mind?

MS: There is always a vision, and our vision is to take Angeethi to almost every location of Karachi and then to expand it in other cities of Pakistan.

GU: What is the heart dish of angeethi?

MS: Makhni Handi is the heart of Angeethi, Barbecue, and Biryani. More over all the items are up to the mark.

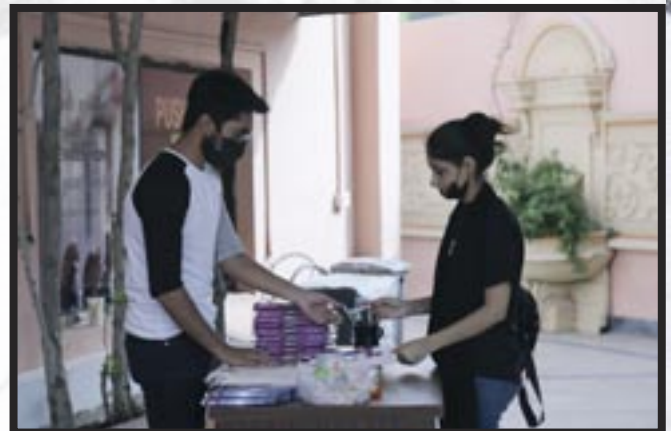

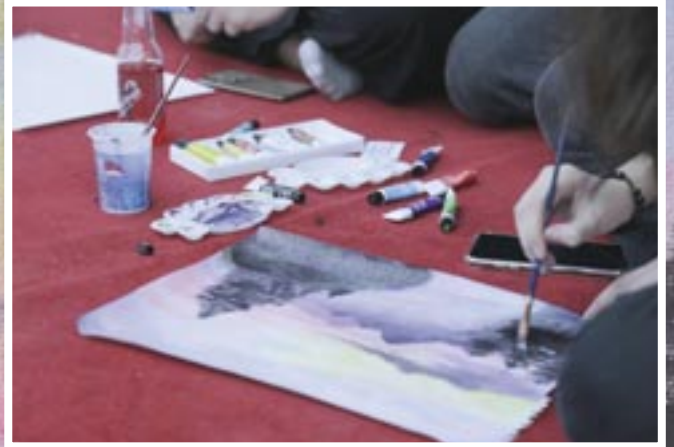
