
High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development





Greenwich University Journalism Association Meet-up



Student Development Council Election 2023







American Film Showcase Film Screening, Panel Discussion & Workshop



International Workshop on Decoloniality, Equity and Inclusivity for Sustainability

On June 5, Mr. Ali Jillani, alongside co-facilitators Dr. Christopher Schwand and Dr. Anna Fornalska, conducted an insightful workshop on Decoloniality, Equity, and Inclusivity for Sustainability at IMC University of Applied Sciences in Krems, Austria. The session brought together young thought-leaders from across the globe to engage in critical discussions on democratizing global development by decolonizing education, trade, and policy processes.

The workshop challenged participants to reimagine a more just world through John Rawls' Veil of Ignorance, exposing the weaknesses of traditional thought leadership and the failures of politico-economic structures in addressing pressing global issues such as cultural crises, social polarization, and widening inequalities. The facilitators underscored how underdevelopment is not incidental, but a direct consequence of deliberate policy interventions that have historically resulted in epistemicide—the systematic erasure of indigenous knowledge systems—along with exploitation and oppressive colonial legacies.

Discussions highlighted how coloniality persists today through manipulative trade policies, restrictive state governance, weak regulatory mechanisms in former colonies, and foreign policy impositions, disproportionately affecting billions in the Global South. Participants critically analyzed how neoliberal policies from the North dominate and marginalize the South, perpetuating global inequalities.

The workshop also reviewed the progress and setbacks of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), emphasizing how multidimensional crises, including the aftermath of COVID-19, have exacerbated global disparities. Participants from Asia, Africa, North and South America, Oceania, and Europe collectively envisioned an alternative framework focused on Development Justice, aiming to dismantle systemic barriers rather than merely achieving thematic SDG targets.

This thought-provoking session reinforced the urgency of equitable global transformation and the need to challenge entrenched structures that perpetuate inequality.







His Excellency Dr. Saeid Talebinia's Visit to Greenwich University


Celebration of cultural relations between Pakistan and Iran














Research Seminar on multi-method research






